Some of the historical contributions Paul has made to automotive designs include: facelift for the 1961 Chevy Corvair, being part of the design team for the Monza GT concept car (Paul designed the side of the car while Larry Shinoda & Tony Lapine designed the front & rear); having the patent on the 1961 Corvair wheel cover, designing Corvair emblems; designing several front grills of Pontiacs, creating the red-lined tire, and creating/designing the rare (one year only produced) split back window for the 1963 Corvette (just We were to name a few). privileged to gaze upon his many original sketches and photographs (including a slide presentation) of the cars, trucks, and planes he worked on. These sketches are currently being shown on the DACC Facebook page. Paul told many funny stories about the pranks he pulled on other designers/bosses that had all of us laughing. After his presentation, he was given a standing ovation. Paul will be one of my featured speakers at the upcoming "Meet the Makers" event on May 14th. #### **WINTER PROJECTS**

Man is it just me or does this winter seem to be dragging. Talk about dragging. I've been dragging myself down to my pole barn and forcing myself to work on the Greenbrier. It's not the motor this time it's the body. I enjoy the rough bodywork like replacing sheet metal, welding and fabricating parts. The Greenbrier needed part of the side door pillar cut out and replaced. Lucky for me when I purchase the vehicle from Clark, he provided that piece. So out came the cutoff tool and within a half hour the cancers piece was removed. Then I cleaned the inside area and painted it with POR-15. POR-15 encapsulates the rust and stops it. Then I spot welded flanges to the two sides so the new piece could side into place. This gives me fresh metal to weld to and it's easier than butt-welding the piece when the metal is thin and rusty. I have picture on my camera if you would like to see what it looked like before and after.

Well the side door pillar is finished and now it's time to repair the side door bottoms. The bottoms of both doors are rotten. The pinch weld is gone. So the bottoms have to be cut out and new door bottoms need to be fabricated and welded in. I have complete one door so far and will be starting on the second side door tomorrow. Some of our members love the fine sanding before painting and that part is one of the most important parts of a nice paint job. But, I can't stand it! Wish I did 'cause I have a lot to do. By our March meeting I hope to have all the doors repaired and painted. NO, not a complete paint job, just paint the parts of the doors that had to be repaired. Next winter I hope to repaint the entire van inside and out.

My next project will be the 66 convertible that I started in the summer and haven't got back to.

#### DACC MINUTES 2-9-2015 - Gigi Debbrecht

Meeting called together at 7PM and turned over to Eva McGuire who arranged for our 3 speakers Eric White, Robert Edwards and Paul Deeson, former GM designers. These men and 127 former plant workers and executives will be participating in the May 14 museum event. David Cole, Ed Cole's son will be the guest of honor. Stu and Tim and several others with GM and Corvair ties will present him with an original oil painting and members of the Ypsilanti township commission will read a proclamation issued by Governor Snyder.

The first speaker was Eric White who has collected automotive items for 40 years and is the president of the Automotive History Preservation Society. Because paper does not last forever and is often destroyed, this group is dedicated to digitally cataloguing and sharing printed items relating to automobiles. This not-for-profit group was started in 2010 and now has 250,000 items digitally stored and shared without charge. The "Wild About Cars" has been turned over to "No Limits" magazine which is looking for donors to keep the site running. Since digitizing is a time intensive process, they are looking for volunteers to assist in the process and printed information on all cars sold up to 1999. The website is ahpoc.org and Eric's email address is gtoric@charter.net

The second speaker was Robert Edwards, an artist who attended CCS who started accumulating old car design drawings. He discussed the history of design importance in the automotive industry started after World War II when automotive executives decided that styling would help sell cars. For competitive reasons, design proposals and decisions were kept secret and most designs and drawings were destroyed and the actual designers not really given credit in most cases. He suggested the site americandreamingfilm.com.

Our last speaker was Paul Deeson who spent 42 years on the GM design staff. He did some work on the redesign of the new front of the original 1960 Corvair requested by Ed Cole. as well as design elements of many other GM automobiles. He described the process of designing and clay modeling of changes and told about a number of pranks played back and forth by designers.


