# The Preventive Maintenance Series

## Homemade Tools Inspired by Gloomy Winter Days

Homemade tools are a fun way to show your creativity. I try to keep a list all summer long of new tools I might be able to make during winter, most of the time finding scraps and leftovers that work nicely. Maybe a paint job and even a "J" number if the tool works really well!

#### Distributor Shaft Support Tool

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Disassembly of a distributor for service work includes driving out two different sized pins that locate the shaft in the housing and secure the driven gear. I built a holding fixture out of scrap wood that lets you drive both pins during disassembly and assembly. Drill a 1 1/8 inch hole in one wood block and a 9/16 inch hole in another. Saw through the middle of both and attach them to a base after measuring and determining their heights.





#### **Distributor Bushing Removal Tool**

GM never offered a replacement bushing; you had to buy a new housing with the bushing already installed. However, the bushings are available and they do press in easily. The only trick is getting the old one out. The area supporting the bushing is ribbed, making use



of a bushing driver impossible. My solution was to make a simple pusher out of 1/8 inch by <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inch steel stock, about four inches long. You will need to use a cutoff wheel or grinder to trim the sides down to about .625 (5/8"). This will now fit in the ribs and although I use mine in a press, gentle application of a hammer would probably work fine. Pressing the new bushing in can be done with the driver of your choice.




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#### Powerglide Shifter Cable Bracket Wrench

There are not many fasteners on a Corvair that only accept an open end 5/8 inch wrench but the nut that holds the shifter cable to the dashboard bracket on all Powerglide equipped vehicles certainly does. And the area the wrench can operate is limited, especially on FC vehicles. This is not a high torque nut so I shortened a cheap wrench to 1<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inch and ground down the outside until it fit easily on the nut.

If you have a Snap-On type ball joint tool (CJ91D or C) but are missing the special Corvair tool (CJ 76A-3) you can make one as follows:

Obtain a 15/16-inch 12 point, shallow, 1/2 inch drive socket (\$3 at Home Depot) and lightly grind the face until it is flat. It will fit the new bushing shell perfectly. Next, check your used parts stash for a 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inch washer; you will need a 3/8 inch hole for the guide bolt. The bolt needs to be long enough to have a 1 inch smooth shank. Grind the bolt head down to a tight 1/2 inch square and cut it off at the 1 inch point. This should tightly fit inside the socket. There is a chamfer inside the socket. Leave the bolt head just at the bottom and perfectly straight. Weld in two of the squares and grind back flush. This pin is only a guide and does not take pressure. The washer now fits over the bolt and you can use a couple of welds to hold it in place. Add a sacrificial loose washer with grease to the guide and you are ready.



#### Pitman Arm Bushing Installation Tool

The pitman arm bushing assembly used on all Corvair cars is a three-piece design with a center bolt for mounting, inside of a rubber bushing; both of which are captured in a steel shell. The steel shell is a press fit into the pitman arm, which necessitates a pushing device for a C-clamp type press to do the work on the car. There is a plastic bushing available but it is a bad choice for several reasons; you loose the insulating effect of the rubber which means road shock is now transmitted into your gear box parts, plus you feel more road shock in the steering wheel. Also, I have removed several of those bushings, which had galled and made steering harder plus even more wear on steering box parts.

# 7 J.C. Ash's Garage

Marilyn and J.C. Ash host an event for the Green Country Corvair Group (GCCG) much like Mike Dawson's Working Tech Sessions for HACOA and Terry Kalp's Tunas for MCCA where club members work on each other's Corvairs and help keep them on the road. The event is simply called J.C.'s Garage and is held the fourth Saturday of each month. This has been in my plans for a few years now but it starts at 9 a.m. and is over at noon so it's not a very practical day trip for me at six hours each way.

Fortunately this year I had an excuse; I needed to pick up the Valve Cover Track Trailer from Green Country so we can use it at the CORSA National Convention this summer. I was even more fortunate when Larry Sherwood decided to come along and offered to drive. So we made it a two-day trip.

Let me tell you a little about J.C. and Marilyn Ash. You may have visited with them at Round Ups. They always have one or two (or five) Rampsides on display. I believe they currently have 11 FC Corvairs, at least three of which are of Concours quality. J.C. is retired from Sheffield Steel and is a professional welder and fabricator. After retiring J.C. started a boat propeller repair shop, which kept him too busy, so he sold the business in order to travel. He loved exploring caves, so he and Marilyn bought a motorhome to do just that. He estimates that he has been in over 2,000 caves.

Larry and I arrived in Sand Springs around 6 p.m. on Friday. We went to J.C.'s shop for a private tour. The shop is divided into three areas. The first area is where he keeps his 1957 Chevy, two or three Corvairs and his 40-foot motorhome. The center area is where he parks his daily driver and two or three more Corvairs. Then there is the main shop, where most of the work happens. He has three large air compressors, welding rigs of every kind, plasma cutters, lathes, presses, drill presses and an impressive number of air tools. If you visit his shop ask to see his metal descaler—just cover your ears before he operates it. Along with *more* Corvairs in this area was a 1933 Chevy, which Larry, with a little coaching from J.C., figured out how to start. It purred like a kitten.

J.C.s newest Rampside was on the center post lift. I mentioned to J.C. that Larry and I would like to have a look at the air conditioning system. J.C. is a man with a lot of skillful friends. He asked one, who was an automotive A/C expert, for his suggestion on a good small condenser unit. His advice was to use one out of an '80s or '90s Toyota pickup. J.C. got one and it fit beautifully under the passenger-side floor. He routed air from the front grill down to the condenser giving plenty of airflow. The end result was a system that not only cools the cab but also looks designed for the truck.

The next morning we arrived at the shop at 9 a.m. where coffee, donuts and Marilyn's tasty sausage rolls were waiting. A group from Central Oklahoma Corvair Association drove up from

At noon the party was moved to the Crescent Café for a mini-meeting and lunch. Afterwards Larry and I headed back to KC with the Valve Cover Track Trailer. To pass the time Larry played his classic rock compilation and I tried to guess the artist and song title. I did pretty well except I couldn't come up with the name Moody Blues and confused the Hollies with the Bee Gees. The trailer now is sitting in Larry's driveway waiting for our upcoming Valve Cover Track Repair and Trailer Repacking Party on Saturday, April 29 in Scott's shop. (See page 2 for details.)
