

Minutes of the San Diego Corvair Club January 11, 2018

The monthly meeting of the San Diego Corvair Club was called to order by President Lorrie Tustison at 7:05PM. There were no guest present among the 21 attendees. One member drove his Corvair to the meeting.

Lorrie called for a motion to approve the minutes of the meeting of November 9, 2017. Those minutes were approved.

Lorrie then called for a treasurer's report. Treasurer David Kerth reported as follows:

New Business:

Lorrie reminded the members that the January, 2018 activity is a Snowfall Tour to Julian, CA on January 27th. After breakfast at Dudley's Bakery in Santa Ysabel, members will leave for Julian at 11:00AM.

Lorrie requested a report on the Great Western Fan Belt Toss & Swap Meet (GWFBT&SM). In Mike Evans absence, John reported that the dates are set for October 26-28, 2018. The host hotel is the Quality Inn, with rates of \$72.00/night. Activities, such as nature and location of the banquet, have yet to be established, as has a t-shirt design.

Lorrie then invited Carol Peters to offer tickets to the opportunity drawing during the course of the meeting.

Lorrie continued by announcing that the February, 2018 activity will be a potluck at Larry and Lorrie's new home on February 18th at 2:00PM. Tom Wright is slated to speak at the February, 2108 meeting on wheel studs, replacing rear window on convertible, and installing a retractable antenna.

The March, 2018 meeting will feature Rod Tetrault speaking on Corvair brakes. The activity has yet to be determined.

Melrose Dr., Suite D, Vista, CA). Since the distance to the meeting venue, and the time to reach the venue are considerable, she encouraged members to carpool to ease transport costs.

Old Business: Lorrie described the efforts over the past few months to create a time/place/mentoring plan for Corvair repair. She invited Brett and Scott to advise SDCC regarding this effort. Brett and Scott announced that the date for the first session will be January 28, 2018 at the Coronado base. A description Sheet entitled Weekend Warriors Corvair Repair Group, together with a signup sheet, were distributed to the members present. On behalf of the entire SDCC membership, Lorrie expressed appreciation to Brett and Scott for their efforts.

There being no further business to come before the Club, Lorrie adjourned the meeting at 8:25PM.

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Vair Tales, Part Five Corvair as Taxi

We were now in a suburb of Mexico City named Coyoacan, located south of the downtown area. Think how Long Beach is south of Los Angeles, only five times the size. We settled into a little house behind a larger house. The Corvair had to sit outside, but at least it was in a driveway and not on the street. We shared the house with two other women. They were high school Spanish teachers, down to brush up on their Spanish and immerse themselves in the culture. We were enrolled in Spanish (consisting of lecture and lab), Mexican History, and Mexican Folklore.

The two women Spanish teachers had flown to Mexico City, and had no car. We had little language skills. So, we made a deal: We'll be the transportation, and you be the translators. It worked out really well! The only problem was, there was no back seat in the Corvair! We solved that problem with several pillows and several blankets. The four of us, whizzing around in the Corvair, made good use of after school and weekends.

After school junkets involved visiting as many of the sights in the city as possible. We went to museums, parks, open air markets, shopping downtown – in the weeks we were there, we saw a lot! We also saw how residents drive in dense, chaotic conditions. It was the first time I had ever seen motorists drive on the sidewalk, and the first time I'd seen cars jump the raised median, and drive on the other side of the road, opposing traffic! Fortunately, no one hit us, and we didn't hit anyone, either.

We found the Corvair to be light and nimble; steering response was somewhat slow, but accurate. The car came equipped with two ply 7:00 X 13" U.S. Royal Larado Rain Tires. They didn't have too much grip, but they rode comfortably. The brake action was very good; firm, even, and no discernable fade. Weekend trips to Taxco, Tenochtitlan, Tolupa and other points of interest were met with near universal praise from Mexicans for this beautiful, unusual car. We learned that few Mexicans had ever heard of, much less seen, the second generation Corvair.

Our summer session came to an end. We bid good bye to our host and our teacher friends, and set out for home. We intended to retrace our route through Guadalahara, Tepic, and Mazatlan, and make a few stops to surf. We had read about a surf spot in San Blas called Matuchin Bay. It reputedly had the longest right in the world. It was not too far off our route. So, we drove there and camped for the night. It was really hot, and the mosquitos were more numerous and aggressive than anything we had ever seen. We also learned about no-see-ums. Little tiny, biting insects. Really annoying. We spent our nights trying to decide between the oppressively hot tent, or being eaten alive.

While the nights were a nightmare, the surf was epic! Really long, clean lines; so long that Sharon would drive down the beach until I kicked out and paddled in. I'd load the board on the rack and drive back out to the point. I estimated some of the rides at over ½ mile in length! I was having a great time, but Sharon was not. The mosquitos and no-see-ums were relentless. Her only recourse was to go in the water up to her neck. We quickly decided to pack up and get on our way.

That Sinking Feeling

Before departing San Blas, we needed to wash the car. Since we were camping, we had no access to the usual hose, bucket, and wash mitt. So, we drove the car close to the water's edge, and washed it with a towel and sea water. Remember, we were 23, and knew everything...

What we quickly learned, however, was that the tide was coming in. Each successive wave moved closer to the car, until waves were coming under the car. We thought that was good, since we didn't have to go so far to get water. What we failed to see was that, with each wave, the car was sinking into the hard packed sandy beach. When I saw what was happening, I quickly jumped in the car, started the motor, put the trans in reverse, and attempted to back up. While the Corvair has excellent traction, I couldn't get the car to move! We yelled at the other surfers on the beach for help, and several came running. Between them pushing and me driving, we freed the car, and drove higher up the beach.

By now it was getting dark, and we needed to be on our way. The road from San Blas to the highway is about 20 miles. Continued on page 8

Our T-3 headlamps were not as bright as today's lights. After a few minutes we looked ahead, and the road appeared to be moving! We slowed the Corvair and, looking ahead, were astounded to see a tarantula migration across the roadway! There were thousands and thousands of them. We watched in awe for a couple minutes before deciding to gingerly move ahead through the tarantulas. I watched my odometer; we slipped and slid across 3/10's of a mile of tarantulas.

Arriving in Mazatlan, we set up the tent, killed the mosquitos, and fell into a fitful sleep. Next morning, we awoke to a sunrise illuminating three offshore islands. The islands did not look to be too far from shore, so we decided to visit them. Since we only had one surfboard, we took turns swimming and paddling the board. It turned out the islands were a LOT further from shore than we thought! We arrived exhausted, but recovered sufficiently to beachcomb. We loaded our treasures on the board, and set off for the mainland. One of our treasures was a Hermit crab and his shell. We named him Hermie, and Hermie had the run of the inside of the Corvair.

The rest of the trip back to our little house in Torrance was uneventful. Except for Hermie. Hermie decided to crawl into the heater vent located in the front footwell below the radio. He was never seen again.

While Hermie's fate was sad, our little Corvair did not suffer serious harm. We drove it a total of 8,000 miles on this venture without a single problem. We did not use any oil, we did not change the oil or filter, nor did we lube it. The car did not squeak or rattle, and nothing fell off, despite the horrendous roads. When I serviced the car, I noticed the tires were pretty worn, and the steering was a little loose. The steering looseness was caused by a badly worn pitman arm bushing, which was replaced when the Corvair suspension was realigned. Shortly thereafter, we replaced the tires with those newfangled "radial" tires.

So – did we retire the little blue Corvair after this adventure? Nooo...In fact, its' adventures were just beginning! Its next adventure was a national, rather than international one. We'll get to that adventure next month.
