

Taillight Socket Repair

Recently during one of our MCCA Road Trips a fellow club member let me know I had an intermittent taillight. Once I got home and had time to investigate I determined the steel shell that holds the bulb in-place had backed out of the plastic body of the taillight socket. The barbed tangs that hold the steel shell in-place are just a press fit in the plastic shell. The constant pressure from the springsteel electrical contacts in the base of the socket had, over time, causes the steel shell to work its way up and away from the contacts, causing the intermittent connection. I tried re-seating the steel shell in the plastic body but there was no longer a friction fit to hold it in-place.

This is a common problem.

My solution was to use a #4 x 3/8" sheet metal screw through the side of the plastic body to hold the steel shell in place. I used a 1/16" drill to create a small pilot hole and placed the screw in the long raised section along the bottom side of the socket (as installed). This gives the screw a little more bite and also hides the screw from view.


Important Tips:

- File the tip of the screw flat where it contacts the steel shell so the screw remains square when tightened; otherwise it will want to walk sideways.
- Install the bulb before tightening the screw; otherwise the bulb may be difficult to install. (Remember also to loosen the screw before replacing the bulb in the future.)

Do not to overtighten the screw. You only need enough tension the hold the steel shell in place.



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
that were missing. He also repaired toys for others.

A hopper would be filled with fine sand then a lever would be tripped and the sand would be metered out in small bits to make the toy operate until the bin was empty. Use the captured sand to reload the bin and the process started all over again.

The next generation of powered toys used large marbles for power. The bin of marbles would drop one into a bucket, the weight made the bucket travel downward and power the mechanism. The next generation of toys Roy showed were wind-up, powered by one or more springs. It was fascinating the variety of different toys in Roy's collection.



After Roy's presentation everyone went upstairs to set in the soft light around the dining room table. Connie had created some sweet snacks for the group. The Juenemann's hospitality was top notch. Thanks Roy and Connie.
