My Trip to Clark's CAVEMAN PETE K

Sunday morning bright and early, well it wasn't bright but it was early! My trip to Clark's Corvair Parts in Shelburne Falls, Massachusetts started out dark and dreary around 3 AM on November 3rd. Or was it 2 AM? That was the day that Daylight Savings Time officially changed back to Eastern Standard Time for us here in Michigan. Who ever is responsible for making the change was asleep at the switch because all of my electronic clocks didn't change over until around 2:30 AM (or was it 3:30?). Now who stays up 'till 2 in the morning just to comment on when the automatic clocks revert back to EST? Anyway.

The purpose of the trip to Clark's was to deliver a vast collection of new old stock (NOS) Corvair parts that former DACC member the late Harold Dexter had amassed at his place in Fenton. After four successive Garage Squad work sessions at the barn in the month preceding my trip my truck was packed up and I rented a 6x12' U-Haul trailer to carry the valuable collection of sheet metal panels to Clark's. The trip itself was a tough grind. 800+ miles one-way and about 16 hours on the road got me to Greenfield, MA just a few short miles from my final destination. The next morning I was the first one to arrive at 400 Mohawk Trail. The staff arrived and we began the arduous task of unloading and identifying all of the goodies. The sheet metal panels were laid out in the driveway so Cal and his crew could inspect and tag the parts. The smaller parts that were in the cab and bed of my truck were taken inside a building and placed on tables. It became apparent very quickly that this was going to be a monumental task to figure out what we had and what it was all worth.

We decided to just leave the collection in Cal's care and he would complete the inspection and pricing and send a check. Garage Squad To the Rescue! CAVEMAN PETE K

Who would have thought that tucked up inside the various barns and buildings on the Harold Dexter property in Fenton, Michigan was a hoard of valuable new-old-stock Corvair parts? Sure, anyone driving up or down US-23 just south of the golf course on the west side of the highway could see several derelict Corvairs strewn about outside in the yard and next to the big red barn. But what was inside those barns was even more exciting!

Harold passed away a few years ago. Seems that he had a knack for collecting. Upon inspection we counted an even two dozen sad Corvairs in various states of disrepair sitting outside. There were a few better ones that had an inside space to rest in. The family called on members from Harold's car club, the Detroit Area Corvair Club to come and advise them as to how to handle the disbursement of this collection. Most cars were beyond saving and we let the surviving family members know that. Some cars had desirable features and options that added to the value of an otherwise worthless carcass. These cars were singled out and the family found buyers for most of them rather quickly.

When we were checking out the Corvairs inside the one barn we spied a pair of special gokarts stacked up in a dusty

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corner. These were built as promotional items back in the 1960's by Rupp Manufacturing at the request of Chevrolet Motor Division of GM. They were called "Monza Jr's" and resembled the famous full-sized version show car Monza SS from 1963. As it turned out these were the key to a much bigger find in the same barn.

Previous attempts to buy cars or parts from the collection were rebuffed. The family just wasn't ready yet. Once a fair offer was made and accepted for the pair of fiberglass bodied gokarts the family asked if we could help them sell off the Corvair parts. Enter the DACC Garage Squad!

The scope of the collection of parts was mind boggling. Harold had been stashing new-old-stock parts up in the rafters and hay loft of the barn for years. Cleaning this up and getting the bits and pieces back into the hobby was not going to be a one-man job. Not even a twoman job. Over the course of the next month every Saturday or Sunday a team of Garage Squad members met at the entrance to the barn. Our first goal was to bring everything down to ground level. Then an inventory could be made of the stacks and stacks of new never used Corvair sheet metal panels. Once the size of the collection was identified we needed a plan to sell everything. The logical choice was to approach the largest Corvair parts supplier in the country,

Clark's Corvair Parts in Shelburne Falls, MA. They were very interested so a list was sent to them and plans were made to rent a trailer and deliver the parts to Massachusetts.

On the final Saturday at the barn the trailer arrived and the Squad members worked for hours to load everything up. The next day a 16 hour marathon drive brought the collection within 6 miles of the final destination. Monday morning dawned a bit chilly, but the staff at Clark's were up to the task. Sheet metal panels were laid out on the pavement and smaller parts were brought inside and displayed on tables. It was at this point that the true size and scope of the task at hand was understood. In the final account it took nearly two weeks to properly identify and value all of the parts from the Harold Dexter collection.

And we're not done yet! There are a couple more barns and buildings that we didn't enter yet. Looks like another Garage Squad activity next Spring and probably another trip to the East Coast. The \$\$\$ from selling this collection will help the family finish the new house that they built on the property. The benefit to the Corvair hobby has to be the influx of so many really rare parts that have not been available for decades. And if we help the Clark's organization to continue to supply the new and reproduced parts that we need to keep our Corvairs alive.
