The Preventive Maintenance Series

Brake Hoses

All Corvair vehicles except late model cars have flexible brake hoses on all four corners that attach between the steel lines on the body and the wheel cylinders. The late model rear wheel cylinders have a short steel line between the wheel cylinder and the trailing arm where the hose is mounted.

The hoses are approximately ½" in outside diameter but only 3/32" inside diameter. This creates a heavy duty hose which is needed to withstand the hydraulic pressure without deforming and causing a soft pedal. The outside covering will crack from flexing and be noticeable long before the hose would ever fail; a nice design feature that alerts you to needed maintenance. There is a tendency to only change hoses if no cracks show but after 50+ years in service another issue comes up regularly — plugged hoses.

Note the picture below which shows how small the internal diameter is. If the crimped steel ends rust badly and expand, they may crush the hose enough to partially or totally restrict the fluid. And a partially plugged hose can act like a one way valve; letting high pressure from the master cylinder through but stopping lower pressure fluid from returning. Locked up or dragging brake shoes may result.



Another blockage can occur when the area between the two brass inserts rusts badly and ends up plugging the hose. The picture below shows this type of issue, and the adjacent cross section from a similar hose demonstrates the blockage.



The rust formed between the two brass inserts after the brake fluid absorbed moisture. Avoid leaving the lid off of brake fluid containers and your master cylinder, flush the system every few years and replace the half-century-old parts to ensure you stop when you need to.

When replacing any hose, you should check the new clearance to other parts while turning the front wheels and bouncing the rear. A hose that is the wrong length can either rub on another component or be stretched by suspension movement. And leaving a twist in a front hose can cause tire contact in tight turns.



Other Events and Tidbits




