The Preventive Maintenance Series

Grounds; 50+ Year-Old Circuits Are Showing Their Age

Many Corvair electrical glitches are caused by poor or no grounds; the electrical "complete circuit" necessary for an item to function is open or has a weak link.

In order for electricity to perform its job, the wire supplying an item from the battery must be large enough (gauge size) to carry the required amps and keep the voltage up. The ground wire or path back to the battery also must be at least identical in capacity. Where body or engine parts are used in place of ground wires, the parts must have a clean, tight fit that at least duplicates the size of wire supplying the positive battery current.

Some good examples of common problem areas:

• A Corvair starter may draw 160 amps through the positive battery cable when cranking but the mating area of the cable clamp and battery post must have a clean contact area to do this. Likewise, the connection of the cable to the starter solenoid must be clean and tight. For the return to the battery the circuit is completed by good contact between the starter nose and its two bolts to the aluminum housing (no heavy paint). The return

travels through the engine to the generator or alternator mount where it must then use the same capacity cable as the positive side to carry 130 amps to the negative battery post. A major problem will arise if the negative battery cable is attached to the body and not the engine (the powertrain is mounted in rubber except for small attachments). Missing this large capacity ground between the negative battery post and the engine can burn Powerglide shifter cables, clutch cables and other items that can only supply a small ground.

- Missing a good ground between the battery and the body can affect charging and in some cases ruin an alternator or generator as the regulator tries to overcome the lack of ground available. Early models fitted the negative battery cable to the body and engine with one braided battery cable. Late models have a separate 10-gauge pigtail on the negative cable that bolts to the body next to the battery.
- Slow heater motor speeds can occur when the heater box slowly loses its ground to the body (all Corvairs). You don't suddenly hear the change as the loss creeps over the years. A quick check is to use a jumper wire (while the blower motor is turned on high speed) between the blower motor body and the engine sheet metal that is close by. If the blower motor speeds up, make the jumper wire permanent. This can really be significant if you are using a late-style high-speed blower with a remote relay.
- Other common ground problems are: late-model car dashboards, early-model car and FC taillight housings, early-model front turn-signal sockets and late-model rear taillight/brake light sockets.

Grounds can be checked with a voltmeter by looking for potential difference, i.e. connecting in parallel to the negative side of a circuit. In the above example with a slow blower motor, instead of using a jumper wire, connect your voltmeter between the blower body and a good engine ground area. If you get a meter reading with the blower running, the ground circuit is insufficient. Another example would be to use your voltmeter to check the battery-to-engine ground while cranking as in the picture below. Ideally, you would use the top of the battery post instead of the clamp for the best results (or have recently cleaned that contact area).



The voltage drop while cranking should be 0.20 volt or less.


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


