Q & A With Andria Raine

Q: Tell us about yourself

A: Born in Greensburg Pa in the mid fifties, moved to Maryland in 1960. After graduating High School in the mid seventies I wandered a while without purpose and had a few jobs prior to becoming an apprentice Locksmith in the late seventies. I have worked in automobile dealerships and parts stores over the years as well as I was raised around the mid to late thirties automobiles which were associated with my father. I am still working as a Locksmith for a state agency but as much as I had an interest in automobiles, I never did much in the way of automotive lock work. I am planning to retire within the next ten years or so.

Q: Who, what, when got you interested in Corvairs?

A: In 1962 Dad brought home a brand new Monza Wagon. Over the years he had several interesting vehicles and I guess the car gene was passed down to me. As it happened, my first car was a 1963 Corvair 500 coupe with an automatic transmission.

Q: How many Corvairs have you owned, and how many do you currently own?

A: First car was the 1963 500 coupe followed by two 1965 Corsa convertibles that got combined into one that I drove through High School. Others included a 1966 500 coupe 140, HD suspension, fast box and a three speed, a couple more late convertibles, a greenbrier deluxe, a Kelmark converted Mid Engine late coupe and several parts cars. Currently I have a 1962 95 FC Van, a 1965 Monza coupe, and a recently acquired 1965 Monza Convertible. I am sure I have missed one or more.

Q: Are you now, or have you been, a member of other Corvair clubs?

A: Back in the Mid 1970's I belonged to CORSA and Group Corvair where I met many enthusiasts I still see from time to time these days. After an absence in the community I joined Baltimore CORSA but a couple years later it disbanded due to a declining membership and overall lack of participation by it's members. Most recently I joined Mid Maryland and even though I have not been able to attend monthly meetings (mostly due to my working schedule), I have attended as many weekend events as I have been able to. I have enjoyed re-entering the community and meeting new people. One thing I neglected to mention about memberships to Corvair Clubs was that I am registered with both the Corvair Forum and Corvair Center websites. I am more active of the Corvair Center site and go by Caraholic4life on both.

Q: Have you attended any CORSA conventions?

A: I have attended a mini convention that was held in Columbia Maryland in the seventies, went to the Philadelphia convention in 1976 and later, the Twin Cities ...

Q: Have you held any offices in Corvair clubs?

A: No I have not. Do I have any interest it holding one....No I do not.

Q: Tell us about your current Corvair projects

A: I guess they are all projects at this point.

Prep: 10 mins Cook: 1 hr

Servings: 8

Yield: 1 - 9 inch deep dish pie

Ingredients

1 (9 inch) unbaked deep dish pie crust

34 cup white sugar

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon ground ginger

1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

2 eggs

1 (15 ounce) can LIBBY'S® 100% Pure Pumpkin

1 (12 fluid ounce) can NESTLE® CARNATION® Evaporated Milk

Instructions Checklist

Step 1

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.

Step 2

Combine sugar, salt, cinnamon, ginger and cloves in small bowl. Beat eggs lightly in large bowl. Stir in pumpkin and sugar-spice mixture. Gradually stir in evaporated milk. Pour into pie shell.

Step 3

Bake for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350 degrees F.; bake for 40 to 50 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack for 2 hours. Serve immediately or refrigerate. (Do not freeze as this will cause the crust to separate from the filling.)
