Had a chance to start taking apart some of UV211's engine tin. Lots o surprises, skeletons of former squatter, bedding and some ones SillyCone Fix



Oh the fun continues! I am certain now that the engine in UV211 was a 140 not a 110. I found that the distributor was a 0334 which is a 140 distributor instead of 0319 for the 110 and the exhaust was 140 exhaust on 110, no wonder it leaked like crazy. Trying to mate up 140 exhaust logs to 110 tubes.

Not to mention that the exhaust logs were on backwards? Needless to say I rebuilt a 110 distributor from spares that I had around. I will have to correct distributor and has been verified that it meets specs.









Good thing I checked the compression in the cylinders and all were good before I found this..... I did not pay attention to the spark plugs too much when I remove them, I know that none looked "new". I wonder how long you have to run a cylinder with out spark before it cleans it this well. Since I never ran the engine more than putting the UV on trailer and around my house at almost idle, did not notice it down on power.



Put in the piston and cylinders, this is the only part of the build I am not redoing. There was good compression and they look very nice. The only thing that I have no control over is their balance. It is basically impossible to take the rods off the pistons with out damaging anything. At this point I'll take my chances. I put on the baffles before I went any further and forgot!

I also checked or "degreed" the cam and it matched the cam card, it is a FC cam from Ken Hand.



Idea I have been working on. My UV was manufactured in both CA and KS. I have one UV badge on rear that is the KS badge. I was thinking having one a KS badge and one a CA badge. I am thinking of casting my own.....Two ideas.





Class ring found 50 years ago in a Chevrolet Corvair reunited with its owner Ronan Glon



In the late 1960s, the owner of a 1960 <u>Chevrolet</u> Corvair poked around the driver-side footwell to investigate a sticking pedal. Much to his surprise, the issue wasn't due to a linkage-related problem; it was a class ring that a previous owner or a previous passenger had lost. Over 50 years later, the ring has been returned to its owner.

There's no mention of a gold ring in the Corvair's parts catalog, so the owner called the <u>dealer</u> he bought the car from to ask if someone had reported it missing, but he was told it came from an <u>auction</u> and nothing was known about its past. According to <u>The Oregonian</u>, the owner kept the ring instead of selling it. He gave it (and, later, the car) to his daughter, Cindy Johnson, and she stored it in her jewelry box for over half a century.

Fast forward to 2020, and Johnson dusted off the ring in hopes of finding its owner. Admittedly, the odds were against her; the only information she had to work with were the initials SUHS, A, and what looked like either an I or a P. She quickly realized the first set of letters corresponds to the South Umpqua High School in Myrtle Creek, Oregon. The last two were likely initials, and scanning the school's yearbook gave her a name: Arch Hudelson. It was an H, not an I or a P. Luckily, Hudelson was the only 1968 graduate whose first name started with an A.

Contacted via email, he told Johnson that he had lost the class ring he worked hard to buy decades ago, and the two agreed to meet in a park in Fairview, Oregon, to see if he could identify it. It was indeed his, though he couldn't remember how — or when — he lost it. He said he had never owned a Corvair. He also remembered his briefcase was stolen in Portland, Oregon, decades ago, and his class ring may have been in it at the time.

"Found it in a Corvair? I'll be darned. I can't imagine how the thing got there," he told The Oregonian. He plans to have it resized so he can wear it occasionally, "but it's not going to wind up in a 1960 Corvair again."

The moral of the story? Rummage through <u>used cars</u> you buy, and keep in mind that what you find could make someone's day in 50 years or more. As for the Corvair, there's no word on whether it survived to see 2020, too.
