

TECH TIP: AIR CLEANER AIDS

Anyone owning a 64-9 Corvair except turbo models probably has loosened the Jbolts holding the air cleaner runner in place on the carb top and dropped one or all of the J-bolts during the 'lifting and setting aside' of the runner. At the same time there is a scurry to find one or all of the round gaskets between the runner and the carb tops because those gaskets will fall off and roll under something..

Easy fix for not having to fight either/both of the problems again: If you remove the nut from the J-bolt and cut a short length of vacuum tubing and slide down the J-bolt then replace the bolt into the runner and start the nut threads again the J-bolt is trapped in place. Pics show how easy this is to do. Also replace the 3/8" head nuts with wing nuts and much easier to remove the runner next time. Thread size is 10/24 which is easy to find at ACE or LOWES.




Next is ensuring the air horn gaskets stay in place. A couple of very small dabs of weatherstrip adhesive across from each other will keep the gasket in place and at the same time because of the very small 'dabs' it is easy to remove and replace if needed. NO NEED to glue the entire circumference.



Early model cars/FC with the single air cleaners on each side should have a foam gasket for air cleaner top to carb air horn and generally those will stay with the air cleaner top. If the cork gaskets are used in place of the foam then using the above adhesive technique will work for those too.



After doing the above you never need to worry about chasing those little parts around.

When they got the Ultra Van, John and Jim painted it together and it came out very nice.

Let us tell you about the times we (the four of us) would get into the Ultra Van and go cruising up and down allies to look for cars. Yes, you read it right. We would take off for a day and either go out east of town or to a smaller town and look for cars. One time we decided to go to Trinidad. We spent most of the day, always on the hunt for any kind of car. On our way home, we were talking and laughing about what people must have thought about seeing an Ultra Van cruising around, when we heard a siren behind us. It was a Lady State Patrol. This was during the time you could only do 55 MPH. She pulled us over and told Jim she clocked him at 75 MPH. He proceeded to show her the little Corvair engine and explained that a Corvair Ultra Van could not do 75 MPH. She said she did not believe it either and that is why she checked it three times before she pulled him over. Well, he got a ticket and with it the bragging right that his Ultra Van could go 75 MPH.

Jim and Pat loved traveling in the Ultra Van. They were traveling with their friends, Jim and Bonnie Ford, in the Ultra Van and were going over a mountain pass. They were only doing about 5 MPH. PENROSE HERITAGE MUSEUM



The first outing for PPCC members was a trip to visit the Penrose Museum at the Broadmoor Hotel followed by a fun lunch in Old Colorado City. If you've never been to this small museum, you need to make a point of going soon.

The museum was following protocol of limited visitors and masks when we were there. Eight members enjoyed the museum, gathering at 11:00 outside the building, including Ken Schifftner, Garrie Fox, John and Kathy Green, Chris Kimberly, Rick Beets, and Charlie and Jessica Beets. Kudos to Garrie Fox, as he was the lone member to drive a Corvair to the activity (in fairness to everyone else, his 'commute' was very short!!). Pictured here is Garrie's beautiful 1969 Coupe.





The Penrose family was a prominent family in the late 1800's and early 1900's and were major benefactors to the city of Colorado Springs. Spencer Penrose realized there was a tourist potential of folks wanting to visit Pikes Peak and in 1900, so he was instrumental in making sure the first road for carriages to the summit was completed.

In 1915, Penrose decided to bring more visitors and tourists to the Springs and his new hotel, The Broadmoor, by having an automobile race to the mountain's summit. The first Pikes Peak Hill Climb took place in 1916 and was won by Rea Lentz with a time of 20:55.6 minutes. The early races were on a dirt road in all types of weather.

Today, the drivers still deal with all weather conditions but they now drive on a fully paved road, which was finished in 2011. The race route is 12.42 miles with over 150 turns, beginning at 9,390' and finishing at the summit at 14,115'. The best race time to date was set by Romain Dumas in 2018 with a time of 7:57.148. Today, not only do you find race cars competing, there are also trucks, electric cars, and motorcycles in the multi-day event.

PENROSE HERITAGE MUSEUM, cont.

The Penrose personal family collection of carriages and early automobiles are on display on the first floor. The museum's second floor exhibit is all about the history of the Pikes Peak Hill Climb. Actual race cars, historic photos/video clips, trophies, helmets, clothing, are just part of the entire exhibit. They recently added to this exhibit a collection of artifacts from the famous Unser family who are local to the Colorado Springs area. The Unsers have been racing in the hill climb since the 1930's and the most recent Unser family member to win this famous race was Robby Unser in 2004.

Another interesting race car on display is the Mitsubishi driven by Jeremy Foley and Yuri Kouznetsov in 2012 which crashed at the Devil's Playground turn, flipped 14 times and ended up in a ravine. Remarkably, both men walked away, which to me is a miracle after looking at their car. (see photo). They credit modern day safety equipment for their survival.

This is really a great little museum. If you're in Colorado Springs and have an hour available in your day, check them out!



After the museum, everyone drove to Old Colorado City to have lunch at the Thunder and Button where we were joined by Patricia Fox and Dave and Mary Ellen Feasel. Good conversations and yummy food equaled a fun lunchtime with friends. It was a great day to start the 2021 activities for PPCC.


What does this have to do with Corvairs? Maybe something important.

CORVAIR MYTHS

As published in the April, 2021 'Leeky Seel'. The monthly newsletter of the Corvair Minnesota club. I knew some of these, but some were new to me—enjoy!

CORVAIR MYTHS

THERE ARE MANY MYTHS ABOUT THE CORVAIR. EVERYONE SEEMS TO "KNOW" A LOT ABOUT THE CARS, BUT MUCH OF WHAT THEY "KNOW" IS INCORRECT, FOR EXAMPLE:

- THE CORVAIR WAS KILLED BY RALPH NADER Ralph Nader wrote a book entitled "Unsafe at Any Speed" which addressed safety concerns within the automotive industry. Only one chapter of the book mentioned the Corvair. When Nader's book came out in October of 1965, Chevrolet had already decided to cease production. In irony, Nader's book actually help extend the life of the Corvair since Chevrolet decided to keep the Corvair in production until 1969 so no one would think Nader was right. (In fact, based upon intense research in the mid-60's, the Corvair is the only car to ever be "proven" safe by the Federal Government.) The demise of the Corvair can be attributed to two things: the popularity of the Mustang and Chevrolet's desire to build a car to compete with the Mustang, i.e. the Camaro. The Corvair could not be fitted with a V-8 which of course was the engine of choice in the mid to late 60's.
- **THE CORVAIR WAS ONLY BUILT A FEW YEARS** Actually the Corvair was produced for 10 model years –1960 to 1969. The body style changed with the 1965 model year.
- CORVAIRS ROLL OVER Lon Wall, owner of Corvair Underground states "in our 27 year history we have parted out over 800 Corvairs. Many were wrecked (as all cars can be) but yet only 2 out of 800 had been rolled. Go into any wrecking yard in the nation and pick out 800 of any other kind of car and I can guarantee that more than 2 will have been rolled (a LOT more than 2). Quite frankly I've come to the conclusion that Corvairs are probably LESS likely to roll over than other cars! ". There is no evidence that Corvairs are more prone to rolling over than any other car.
- THE CORVAIR WAS DESIGNED BY VOLKSWAGEN (OR PORSCHE) General Motors spent millions of dollars in the 1950's as well as many years of development to make this one of the best designed cars ever built in the US. This myth is usually based upon the fact that the Corvair's motor is air-cooled and rear mounted like the VW or Porsche. The Corvair is 100% American designed.
- **CORVAIRS CONSTANTLY THROW FAN BELTS** Correctly installed belts as well as better designed belts virtually eliminate the "throwing" of fan belts.
- CORVAIRS ALWAYS LEAK OIL In the 1960's, O-ring material was often inadequate for air cooled engines that typically run hot but with the updated material of today, oil leakage is basically a thing of the past.
- I KNEW SOMEONE WHO HAD A 4 CYLINDER CORVAIR All Corvairs were produced with 6 cylinder motors there was no other engine offered as an option. Engine displacement and horsepower ratings varied over the years and models but the Corvair always used the air-cooled 6 cylinder engine.
- YOU CAN'T GET PARTS FOR CORVAIRS Actually almost every part associated with the Corvair is being reproduced today. There are several Corvair specialty vendors producing and offering parts and the prices are in line with most marquee restoration parts.
- THERE AREN'T MANY OF THESE AROUND ANY MORE Well there aren't as many as there used to be for various reasons but there are many still on the road today and there is a large number of individuals collecting them. In fact, the Corvair Society of America (CORSA) has a membership of around 5500 members and most of these members own more than one Corvair.
