Other Things

In one of the "Leeky Seel Extra" pages last month there was reprint of something in the Leeky Seel in the 80s with Bob Johnston talking about how our Corvair club got started in the 70s. I had planned to write about how Bob got started in Corvairs this month but I must confess that I never got around to calling him and now my page is due.

The CORSA club magazine is called the Communique. That name is borrowed from a newsletter sort of thing that Chevrolet itself sent out in the 60s. Since CORSA was founded in the early 70s and Clarks Corvair Parts came along about the same time I just never gave much thought to how it was for Corvair enthusiasts in the 60s. I'm talking about enthusiasts, folks who thought the Corvair was really something special, not just folks who had one as something to drive. I know our own Rich Buratto was avidly pursuing Autocross or Gymkhana with Corvairs back in the day. There were other Corvair performance folks too but many of them were gone by the time I came along in the 90s, they'd moved on to other things.

I saw a printout of a Communique's Corvair Club list from 1964 and was surprised to see how many clubs were listed. In Minnesota I see clubs in Austin, Crookston, Hopkins and Winona. President in Hopkins was Ken Hughes and they met at Suburban Chevrolet. Anyone remember him? Most of these clubs met at Chevrolet dealerships. I think we (North Central Corvair Association) started out in the sales meeting room at Midway Chevrolet in 72 but quickly got too big for the room so we moved to the GM Training Center in Golden Valley. I've met Gene Pearson and Skip Reineke who were early members but they've moved on to other things.

In 64 there was a whopping 11 Corvair clubs in Iowa and 7 in Wisconsin. The thread I saw with the 64 list was trying to figure out the oldest Corvair Club and Madison was in the running.

I saw one in Grand Forks, ND, the Grand Forks Sports Car Club. I've got a SCCA buddy who was going to college there at that time and was involved with sports cars, but more like MGs and Triumphs. They had a lot going on with Ice Races and Autocrosses, I wonder if it's the same club that merely took advantage of a meeting place at the Chevrolet dealership.

It's interesting to me that during those times folks thought enough about the Corvair and it's potential to form clubs about it. I can't imagine today there's a Cruze Club going on at the dealership. On soapbox, someone should probably start a Save The Sedan Society. I was somehow saddened to see a Mustang SUV on the way to the Corvair meeting last month. I suppose it's good and well but I'm desperately trying to cling to my re-SUV roots, off soapbox.

A lot of us have moved on to other things. I sure did and for a long time my Corvairs just weren't on the front burner or even near the stove. I know a few folks who have steadfastly held onto their Corvairs with the idea of getting back to them one of these days. Maybe today is that day. Any journey starts with one small step and just doing one little thing each day builds momentum. I'm as bad or worse at procrastination as any one of you.

One project I finished last year got started with moving all the boxes from underneath it. The Van got started by emptying all the crap out from inside it. Perhaps our Corvair club meetings could have a time for what we've been working on and lend some encouragement. He wasn't really the Lone Ranger with a buddy like Tonto now was he? The biggest thing I miss about seeing Fran Schmit was that he was always working on something Corvair but then again Paul Schuler, Bill Gautsche, Dave Pedersen, Amber Leah and Gary Nelson are the same way.




WHO would'a thunk it!

Since I took apart so many CORVAIR fuel pumps in my research project, I had lots of parts lying around. I decided to clean up my work-space and separate the metal into appropriate piles, mainly Aluminum and other. In case you are not familiar with how many parts are in a fuel pump, I'll show you what one looks like – apart! There's the base, that you bolt to the engine. Then there's the valve body and the pump mechanism, topped by the Main spring and the cover. The spring and cover are iron but there are three big pieces of Aluminum to make up the rest – oh, and then there're all the rubber parts, to seal each moving part from the other moving (leaking?) parts.

When the engine pushes up on the pump mechanism – against the spring – it sucks gas in, from the tank, into an inner chamber of the pump, by by means of an inlet check valve. When the engine stops pushing on the pump rod, the spring tries to expel the 'chambered gas' by pushing it out through the other check valve – to the carbs. If it doesn't all go out – a common occurrence, that's OK, as the engine/pump only pushes on the spring – not on the gas.



The check valves is what I want to point out today. Here's a sketch of how a check valve looks/works. Fuel is pushed up against



flapper shut, preventing reverse flow. Our fuel pump uses two of these to suck the fuel 'in' and then – with a calibrated spring, to push it back 'out', through an oppositely positioned valve – to the carbs. That big spring gives us the fuel pump's pressure rating. The engine only compresses the spring and then the spring feeds us the fuel. Here you see an actual check valve and its spring-loaded flapper and gasket! Say what?



The thing that I didn't expect, was the existence of a teeny little gasket underneath the check valve — where it seats into the housing. This would, I presume, reduce any leakage around the closed valve when it is holding back some pressure. It's only



0.050" wide and punched out of cardboard and/or plastic – actually a fine piece of work. That I had no idea was in there. That makes "more than once" that I've been fooled, Shame on me! OK, so let's still have fun while we, Keep-On-CORVAIRing! *Fran*

Air Cleaner Turbulence

When I found out that my air cleaners, both Early and Late, were choking off my intake of air, not the paper, the Tin!, I started to ask around. Most people just said they used different kinds of air cleaners that have an individual stack of a filter material on top of each carb. I allowed that I had seen that in some

CORSA pictures but never paid much attention to that, as those were the highly motivated guys going for top placement. I was sort of upset that my factory unit was not giving me an OK deal. Then the guy who says he knows about this, agreed with my observation that the EM Tin is really bad (!), which is what I saw, I figured he might have some good suggestions.

He said to put a 4" piece of pipe on top of each carb to let the air smooth out after it

makes that corner, from the cleaner down into the throat of the carb. I said I could do that. Got some 2" PVC plumbing pipe with a straight coupler. This onto the carb with the pipe and paste a bit to make it but a little BONDO is a bumps on the carb that clamp, so I had to fabricate around them. It actually made a nicer fitting mount, with a little Bondo inside, I got a tighter fit. A little Red paint is always a good thing. Here you see four stacks mounted, with a close-up of two of them. The air cleaner, when mounted four inches higher, fits exactly into the fiberglass Engine pad. So, I

could not have gone a half-inch higher. When asked, my advisor said 4" is enough and more won't change anything, so I'm good with this shape, for now.

allows me to slip the coupler coming into it. Had to cut fit nicely, where I wanted it, wonderful thing. There are receive the EM air cleaner



To hold these tall guys down on top of the carbs I had to make looonger "Fran Schmit Spring Loaded Jhooks" - 6 inches long! Turns out I had a nice piece of iron wire that bent when heated and otherwise lent itself to fabrication. With the stacks and the 'Big-X" air cleaner mounted, I can grab the cleaner and shake the car and nothing moves. I think I'm ready to run a test at 6000+RPM and see if they allow the air to turn that corner - smartly! Stay tuned! Let's all have fun while we Keep-On-CORVAIRing, *Fran*
