Spring Tour

We're off to Utica

"Barb and Rich Carroll would love to announce the CCE Spring Tour to Utica and surrounding areas. We will start gathering at the Starved Rock Lodge Main Dining Room (1 Lodge Ln, Oglesby, IL) about 8 AM on Saturday, April 30." We urge you to come early for a great breakfast, then walk through some of the park trails. If Sunday mornings are something you enjoy at a leisurely pace, be aware that all other items on the tour open at 11 or noon, so forgoing the park walk, you could arrive for breakfast at 9:30. While there is lots of items to visit in the area, the trails of the park are the obvious highlight. If you plan to walk, dress for the weather. Most of the areas are easy walking, but a few are more difficult, and the most challenging become somewhat slippery during rain. We strongly suggest planning on some short park walk even if it rains.



All of the items on the tour are within minutes of I-80 in the Utica area. Starved Rock State Park is slightly less than an hours drive from the I-80 and I-55 intersection in Shorewood/Joliet.

We'll stop on the way home at an extremely nice restaurant in Morris, along I-80 on the drive back.

There is so much to see in Utica; we initially thought it would be a two day long tour, but a couple of places won't open in time, so we squeezed, shoehorned, compressed and optionalized (ha, a new word that isn't in the dictionary, but you can figure out the meaning), reducing things to one day. We'll start in Starved Rock State Park, you can drive through the park for free, but the better way is to take a historic Trolley Tour. Park admission is free, but the tours range in price, and vary on time of day offered. Highly suggested is the Waterfall and Canvon Tour, which includes lunch in the Main Dining See times Room noon. and costs https://tinyurl.com/y9gy29fq and also in the area are ghost tours https://tinyurl.com/yatto6qz.

Wineries, Distilleries, and Vineyards.

Barb and I heartily recommend seeing the splendor of

nature in Starved Rock State Park; We encourage hikes, tours and rides through the park. No cost to hike, drive trough, or ride bikes.


If you are out and want to walk a little, Utica puts on their Sweet Stroll 2022 on April 30, https://tinyurl.com/ycxbxuyo. There are cupcakes, https://tinyurl.com/yd885wcx, and chocolates and ice cream, https://tinyurl.com/y8047sbs.

If it's rainy you'll want to visit the LaSalle County Historical Society, https://tinyurl.com/y85bfpsz, which offers (sometimes they claim free, sometimes they claim a \$5 admission for all attractions, sometimes \$3 for seniors.

Near Utica is the LaSalle Lock 16 visitors center. https://tinyurl.com/ydbv3rg9.

We have stopped there for breakfast, lunch, homemade desserts and specialty coffees and teas. We've never been disappointed. They have tickets here to the I&M Canal boat ride, pulled by mules, unfortunately the mules don't start their work until later in May. The fee for the Canal Boat Ride is \$20, but they will offer discounts to a group.

1. There is a new stern drive paddle wheel tour boat (the Sainte Genevieve) for Ottawa, but we talked to the owner, and he is refitting the boat for tours, and hiring staff. Opening is planned for late summer, https://tinyurl.com/ybnm6eld. Tours will go from Ottawa (where River Rescue was) to Buffalo Rock or Heritage Harbor near Marseilles. Owners are hoping for a soft opening during June, and a celebratory opening on July 4. Fees have not been determined.

And, perhaps, we saved t he best to last. Laura Johnson is a young lady who is an artisan, a business woman, a community leader, and a fun person. She claims to be the "hot chick in Ottawa, blowing glass", https://tinyurl.com/ybjelp6e. Her work is mindboggling beautiful. She runs a school teaching others how to handle colored glass, and operates her own shop. Her shop is TINY, holding about a half dozen folks at a time. Her Facebook page tells a better story: https://tinyurl.com/yaxu2zzw.

What about preregistration. We set up this tour so we do not need numbers beforehand. There is no entrance fee or timeline for MOST of what we direct you to. That said, the LaSalle County Historical Society has, on some weekends, set an entry table with collections of \$2 for seniors, \$5 for adults, free for children, and offers of ??? discounts for tours. But their website mentions that all displays are free. They tend to open the one room schoolhouse and the barn only on busy weekends, but there is no (extra) fee for these. If you want to

see the splendor of Starved Rock State Park, and it is WORTH it, driving through is free, hiking is free, but the trolley tours have schedules and prices for various tours.

We would hope that the money you perhaps allotted for the Spring Tour gets spent on local artisans and local attractions.







The Wonderful Electric Forward Control

This article has appeared in the newsletters of various CORSA chapter newsletters since being written by Larry Scrivener of the San Diego chapter, about 30 years ago. I have seen several adventures of Gene Brier over the years. For some reason, they seem to always appear in April newsletters...]

An exercise in Perpetual Motion

It all began when Gene Brier was having trouble getting his 1964 8-door Rampside Deluxe started in the mornings. The thing just wouldn't "catch" with the first round of cranks, and from there on, it was downhill. He'd tried just about everything, for Pete's sake, and was rapidly running out of ideas and batteries.

Now you'd really have to know a thing or two about Gene Brier to appreciate what eventually happened. First off, he's a really creative man. Also, he's one of those people whose brain seems to work an entirely different way than yours or mine; he just automatically cuts across all those lines that seem to hold the rest of us back. Not only that, he doesn't have a whole lot of money, and can't solve every problem simply by dumping it off, at some "specialist".

So, there he was with a truck that wouldn't start except when it felt like it, which wasn't very often. Well, Gene had been a "Ham" radio operator a lot of years back and had a real "feel" for electricity. Seems like he could just SEE what was happening inside a balky toaster or corroded flashlight! Which got him to thinking about the way starters and generators work in the first place. A couple things had bothered him for a long time. They were the fact that—A STARTER DRAWS LESS AND LESS CURRENT AS IT SPEEDS UP and the way A GENERATOR'S OUTPUT GOES UP AS THE FIELD EXCITATION IS INCREASED.

He figured if he could just get the cranking speed HIGH enough, maybe the starter wouldn't draw any current, AT ALL! Hey, it might even put a little back, if he REALLLY got the thing winding up!

So that's what got the project off the ground. The way he did it was of course, to remove three of the sparkplugs, 'cause that always made the engine turn faster when he was making a compression check. Not only that, this particular Rampside usually ran on three cylinders even when he could get it started. So, with #2, #4, and #6 out of the picture, that little old 102 spun around like crazy! Try as he might though, he still couldn't get the starter to put electricity back into the battery, even at 700 RPM cranking speed.

Then he remembered that other thing: the mysterious generator. He tried bypassing the voltage-regulating coils in the hopes that full battery voltage at the "field" would give him a higher output to help crank the starter. (After all the Generator doesn't know it's the starter that's turning it, so it just keeps putting out juice). Now, that worked a little, but still not enough to cure his problem.

What about the 6-volt "hot shot" battery he had bought for his camping lantern? Well, that's what did it. He hooked that battery in SERIES with his 12-volt Delco, wired the whole thing straight into the 'F terminal of the Generator, and MAN—did it ever take off!

With the starter working on only half the compression, and the generator producing somewhere around 35 volts, that thing cranked at 1200 to 1400 RPM and he had plenty of electricity LEFT OVER!

That's when the real stroke of genius took over: why, those other three spark plugs were just holding the thing BACK! So, Gene took the other three ACs out, and let 'er rip!

I ran across Gene and his wonderful Electric Forward Control just the other day. There he was, tooling down University Avenue in high gear, doing close to 37 MPH, with the ignition key held to the "start" position. And all you could hear was the ffft-ffft of those six empty spark plug holes.

So, as Gene Brier says, Keep-On CORVAIRing.

Electrical Theory

"Joe Lucas"

[Editor's Note: This was found running loose on the Internet. All I can say is, "Thank goodness we use Delco."

Positive ground (they meant "earth") depends on proper circuit functioning, which is the transmission of negative ions by retention of the visible spectral manifestation known as smoke.

Smoke is the thing that makes electrical circuits work. We know this to be true because every time one lets the smoke out of an electrical circuit, it stops working. This can be verified repeatedly through empirical testing.

Therefore, it follows that British electrical systems must leak smoke. Once again, the logic is clear and inescapable.

In conclusion, the basic concept of transmission of electrical energy in the form of smoke provides a logical explanation of the mysteries of electrical components especially British units manufactured by Joseph Lucas, Ltd.






