TECH TIP: CAPITALIZE ON THE ATTENTION OUR CARS DRAW PT. 2

Last month I wrote about how much attention our cars draw in car displays and on the street and parking lots. That article focused on those who had memories from the past of their own/family members and friends and neighbors who owned Corvairs. I need to say also that very seldom are there negative comments from this group. They might remember fan belt issues or oil leaks and smelly heaters, but I don't recall ever hearing 'hate' language about the Corvair.

There is another group out there with a different attitude and understanding about our cars. This group have never owned one and only know what they read/heard on the news or general gossip. It can be interesting to visit with someone from this group and the approach to having a conversation with them can vary.

The usual 'statement' almost always includes something about the car that made Nader famous or that he had written a book about how dangerous etc. I had one fellow tell me that Nader went to the president of the USA and forced him to outlaw the cars in 1964. He had a blank look when I told him my car was a 1968.

I have a 'pat' response developed through the years to dispel rumors that Nader was the sole reason the Corvair died. I start out by tell them that the Corvair chapter was only one small part of his book "Unsafe at Any Speed" . I also say that Nader found fault with any rear engine car due to no protection in the front from crashes. This included VW and Porsche/Renault/Fiat but Nader singled out GM due to the fact that GM was a very large corporation.

After a breath I state that the blame for the demise of the Corvair was largely due to

the Mustang and GM itself. I ask if they remember the advertisements in car magazines and even Life magazine in 65-66. The ads for the Mustang depicted a convertible on the beach with a young couple nearby. Also a coupe or fastback at a ski lodge with again a young couple at the car, and last a Mustang on the race track. Ford showed off the car as a younger generation car plus a performance car. At the same time most (not all) of the Corvair ads showed husband/wife and 2.3 kids and a dog; in other words a family car. Yes there was the occasional ad for Corvair with a very small pic of a Corvette at a bottom corner of the page.

I finish my dissertation with a short reminder that GM had the Camaro on the drawing boards, and it was more competitive against the Mustang so GM made their choice. I also add that GM had plans to stop Corvair after the end of 1966, but felt that appeared to many that GM was 'caving in' to the public demands, so the Corvair continued through 1969 even with the added costs of the safety regulation changes and the emission controls added.

Now whether I have ever educated anyone about the Corvair is hard to say but I certainly try and if nothing else they walk away knowing they met a friendly Corvair owner who believes in the car.

Also if any of the readers here prefer to just call the unknowing person a name and walk away I darn sure wouldn't blame you.

As part of the admission registration for the show, there was free admission to the Rosemount Museum, which was the home of the John and Margaret Thatcher family who built the 37-room mansion in 1893. Over 85% of all the furniture and items in the mansion are original to the family. At Christmas they put up 37 Christmas trees inside the mansion and decorate it for the holidays.

Since this is a combined article, the following are thoughts from Mike's perspective of the car show and travels to it.

I've determined I'm not great about getting up early for an extended drive to a car show so I decided to stay overnight in Pueblo near the venue. We had a kids movie night at our office in a drive -in format so I went there first, then left at about 21:00 hrs (9:00 PM) to drive to Pueblo. In the process, the father of one of my co- workers, and a former Corvair owner said I should put my top down. I did and it started raining in about 10 minutes. I put the top back up and it quit. The handy thing was my seats and car were wet so in the process of drying them off I cleaned up a bunch of dust.

Away I go. The car has run fine since all of the hassles during the tri-state weekend, so I made good time to just north of Tomah Road on I-25. 75+ MPH to full stop. I spent the next 30-40 minutes at less than 9 MPH trying not to abuse my clutch. I assumed a multi-car accident which turned out to be a paving operation to almost where the old rest stop was south of the Larkspur exit. Off we go again. I'm looking at a lot of lightning that looked south of Colorado Springs, headed east. I thought the messing around not moving would help me miss the storm, but nope. I was into some pretty serious splash back by the time I got to the eastbound highway 24 exit. I was muddling along in rain and road construction until almost Fountain. I was staying at a Hampton Inn on the south end of Pueblo, and I pulled in at about midnight. I was getting out of

300 Corvair fanciers hold their convention despite Ralph Nader

WASHINGTON — Elwood Schwartz, who said that all told, 1,700,126 of the things were manufactured, smiled when someone asked him how many he owned himself.

many he owned himself.

"Fourteen," he answered, then explained that seven are junks which he cannibalizes for parts, so he really owns only seven that run — seven Chevrolet Corvairs.

Schwartz' Corvair-collection fervor is shared at least to some degree by about 300 persons from all across the United States who converged on the Holiday Inn in Gaithersburg, Md., over the weekend for the second annual convention of the Corvair Society of America.

Corvair, it might be recalled, was the rear-engine economy car manufactured by the Chevrolet Division of General Motors between 1959 and 1969. In its best year, 1961, Corvair sold 317,389 models. In its last year it sold fewer than 3,000.

In 1965 midway betwen its high point and its end, Corvair was singled out for a special one-chapter attack in consumer a d v o c ate Ralph Nader's book, "Unsafe At Any Speed"

Nader alleged that Corvair tended to have rollover problems, that it handled turns badly. General Motors denied the charges, then in 1967 made history by making Corvair the first American economy car to be recalled for modification. The announced cause: possible steering defects.

Later, Consumers Union reported its tests showed that the Corvair heating system had a nasty habit of blowing deadly carbon monoxide into the passenger compartment if defects developed in the exhaust or gasketing systems.

And so it came to pass that

the Corvair was discontinued.
its population dwindling,
never to rise again. It has
joined Packard and Kaiser
and Hudson and DeSoto and
Falcon.

Schwartz, who organized the convention, and his flock of diehard Corvairophiles spent much time comparing notes, trading and selling parts and mechanical knowhow, and, inevitably, talking of things past and things that might have been.

"I mean the Corsa was a real thoroughbred." observed one young man. "It had 180 horsepower, it moved well, handled well, it was a real sport car. But instead of pushing it for what it was, Corvair tried to sell itself on the economy angle."

The Corsa, anyone at the convention could tell you, was manufactured only in 1965 and 1966. In other years, the less fancy Monza was at the top of the line.

Schwartz, 30, is campus director of Youth for Christ, a privately sponsored organization promoting Christian revival among youth.

A soft-spoken, earnest young man, he tended to speak guardedly about his objections to Ralph Nader. "Some of (Nader's) arguments bear truth," Schwartz said. "The car must be maintained and it becomes unsafe if it is not properly maintained.

"With proper tires and brakes and shocks, it's a good, easily manageable car. But we're not a platform to berate others. We get to gether because we dig the car."

Others were not so diplomatic.

"Ralph Nader? We all think he's----," declared Dennis Verdack, 30, a Toyota sales man who lives in Annandale, Va. Washington Post news article:
