BAKER'S CHEESE TIPS

Submitted by Carol Trimper
Taken from Pillsbury Bake-Off Cookbook July 2004 #281

CHEESE 101:

- Asiago: Mild and creamy when young; nutty and semi-sharp with age. Hard. *Pairings: Grapes, figs, crusty bread.*
- Blue: Tangy, ripe and earthy. Semi-hard to hard. *Pairings: Figs, pears, walnuts, fruit, and nut breads.*
- Cheddar: Mild to sharp, tangy and robust. Semi-hard to hard. Pairings: Apples, grapes, cherries, cashews, dark breads.
- Gouda: Mellow, rich caramel. Semi-hard to hard. Pairings: Red apples, toasted almonds, dark breads.
- Havarti: Smooth, buttery. Semi-soft. Pairings: Pears, red grapes, almonds, rye breads.
- Mascarpone: Rich, buttery, slightly sweet. Soft. Pairings: Raspberries, figs, shortbread.
- Monterey Jack: Mild and slightly zesty, nutty with age. Semi-soft to hard. Available marbled or flavored (i.e., Pepper Jack) *Pairings: Plums, peaches, toasted pecans.*
- Mozzarella: Delicate and mild, milky, Soft to semi-soft. Pairings: Olives, tomatoes, roasted red peppers, crispy bread.
- Parmesan: Sharp yet savory flavor that intensifies with age. Hard with a granular texture. *Pairings: Figs, raisins, walnuts, hearty breads.*
- Provolone: Slightly tart and salty. Semi-soft when young, hard when aged with a smooth, firm, texture. *Pairings: Pears, figs, grapes, olives, hearty breads.*
- Ricotta: Mild, slightly sweet, Soft. Pairings: Sweet berries, croissants muffins, mild rye breads.
- Swiss: Sweet to sharp, nutty. Pairings: Green grapes, cherries, roasted almonds, pumpernickel.

Cheese Hints:

- Store cut cheese in refrigerator tightly wrapped.
- Keep cheese in refrigerator until ready to grate. Cheese is much easier to grate when cold.
- Use rule of thumb when measuring cheese; four ounces of chunk cheese equals one cup of shredded cheese.
- Shred or cut cheese into small pieces before melting, or try shredded cheese blends.
- In general, hard cheese like Cheddar or Parmesan cooks better at high temperatures.
- Turn heat on low and stir constantly when adding cheese to a recipe.
- To melt cheese in the microwave, heat on low (30%) until cheese reaches the desired softness or temperature. Check every ten seconds to prevent overheating.



We then took a rainy ride to Crabb's Tropical Treat for lunch. The rain stopped and we all had a nice lunch in the pavilion.





ENGINE REAR HOUSING 1962-1963 Models

Taken from Chevrolet-Central Office Detroit2, Michigan / Technical Service Bulletin DR #623, Section VI, Dated November 21, 1963

Oil leaks at the engine rear housing may be corrected by installing Part No. 6257477 crankshaft rear oil slinger orginally used in 1960-1961 Corvair engines. Install slinger as shown in the 1960 Corvair Shop Manual, Page 6A-45. Install new engine rear housing seal if necessary, as outlined in the 1961 Corvair Shop Manual, Page 6-41.

Both the new flywheel housing seal and crankshaft rear oil slinger are expected to enter production early in the 1964 model year.

Repair Cracks in "Wood" Wheel

Now you can repair that sport steering wheel as used on many '64-'68 models to near perfect condition. First, thoroughly clean out the crack with alcohol. Now for the miracle cure.

Mix up some 15-minute clear epoxy with some dark brown artist chalk, for color. Now carefully fill in the crack little by little, letting each application dry until you have filled it in completely. Your epoxy patch should protrude a little on the final coat because as the glue dries it will shrink. When the final coat is dry, sand it smooth with wet or dry 400 grit sand paper. Finally, sand the whole wheel with 600 grit to remove all excess epoxy and any other scratches or damage.

Now, to bring back the original shine to the plastic, polish with Eagle I brand plastic polish. When you finish you will have a complete wheel that will look great. I have found that the plastic polish is far better than any kind of clean paint coat. The clear paint will get stickily to the touch on a hot sunny day inside the car, even after it has cured. The plastic polish works best.

Clutch/Flywheel Housing

Taken from Chevrolet-Central Office Detroit2, Michigan / Technical Service Bulletin DR #623, Section VI, Dated November 21, 1963

Oil leaks at the clutch or flywheel housing on subject vehicles may be due to a worn housing seal allowing engine oil to seep past into the housing.

This problem may be corrected by installing Part No. 3851853 flywheel housing seal. This new seal incorporates a shield on the engine side to deflect oil away from the seal lip. On 1960 and

some early 1961 engines equipped with a front oil slinger, it will be necessary to remove and discard the oil slinger and snap ring to provide sufficient clearance for the new seal.

Refer to the 1961 Corvair Shop Manual, Page 6!-46 for seal replacement instructions.

Expense Report Item 4: Shady Rest B&B \$22.50 + Deluxe Room w/breakfast + Taxi ride \$5.25

Cal returns to Alan Condo's office to understand his concerns about the rise in missing motor issues.

Expense Reports Item 8: Shady Rest B&B \$22.50 Deluxe Room w/breakfast + Taxi ride \$5.25 + Air fare from Sag Harbor to NYC \$42.30

FINAL REPORT: Jimmy Blackwater, National Insurance Comp (NIC), Hartford, Connecticut

Mr. Blackwater- This case is closed. Findings include the discovery of poor technical knowledge by local officials, poor communication by the selling entity- the dealership, poor problem solving skills of local mechanics. This case should not have occurred. RECOMMENDATION: Suggest NIC probe deeper in such cases to ensure proper authentication is done prior to deployment of a Freelance Insurance Investigator.
