

7. TECH TIPS OR ARTICLE:

Fan Belt Maintenance

CORSA Tech Guide Supplement – 1996 Fan Belts page 5

The Corvair boasted a specially designed belt that GM used only after rejecting at least four different designs. Since GM discontinue4d the original design years ago, no other company ha duplicated it. Anybody can have good luck with a \$3 belt, but if you want one close to the original, use a 3V50 wrapped industrial belt. The original belt was 55 ¾ c 3/8". The 3V560 belt are sold by most Corvair vendors as "super belts."

Installation Checks

The drive pulley or balancer should be checked for wobble or separation and the timing notch checked for a sharp edge that can wear the belt.

The idler pulley should be checked for wobble and dents caused by prybars. The big washer on the slide end of the bracket must be between the nut and the slide.

Check fan pulley for wobble and dents and, most important, for proper height. On-the-car reference: lay a straight edge across the top of the pulley, measure down to the shroud next to the choke rod (intake flange) on the left side. It should measure exactly 6" for '62-69 and 6 5/32" on '60-61. This dimension will be wrong if your fan bearing was installed incorrectly, or if it has moved in the top cover where its interference fit has become loose.

Alternator/generator pulley must be exactly 3" O.D. Rebuilders change them and even a ¼" sized difference will change belt alignment. Look for a loose generator mount on the left end, check for the proper alternator/generator adapter. As with other pulleys, check for dents, wobble and wear.

Belt Tension

There should be a 3/8" deflection with a 15-pound load between the idler and the fan. The book calls for 55 pounds if you have a strand tension gauge. You can barely turn the alternator fan with your thumb when correctly tensioned. Tension should be checked after a break-in period.

Belt Guides

The rear guide can be installed on any year with ease; the top guide should be on any that have the mount holes in the top shroud. Clearance between belt and guide is 1/16".

If the GEN FAN light comes on, stop immediately. Determine if the belt is working or not. If it is, you can drive the car but have the charging system checked as soon as possible. If it is off, replace it before driving. Once a belt comes off, the cords are bent and it will continue to flip.

If you must drive, follow the owner's guide instructions for operation without a belt. Remember, if you ruin an engine by overheating, it usually cannot be rebuilt. Never drive a Corvair with the TEMP PRESS light on. (4/96)

8. CHIT CHAT BY JUNE LINDSAY:

Classic Bikes and Penny Farthing Bike

The car and the bikes are about the same age, from about 1964! These were Donna and her sisters' bikes!! We brought the bikes back from Arizona at the same time we brought the Corvair back to Pensacola. I refurbished the bikes myself with colors that are of Donna's favorite time of the year, HALLOWEEN. The names Broomstick #1 and Broomstick #2 are located on the chain guards. Lucky to have them both.

Since I am resigning my position as an FAA Designated Pilot Examiner effective 01/01/2024, this is a great time to get started with my bucket list, as was going to Dayton to fly in the Wright B Flyer this past September. I have wanted a Penny-Farthing for a very long time, but never had the time to learn to ride it. Finally, I have the time, so I ordered my 50" (front wheel) Excelsior (like some it has no brakes - LOL) from a company in California. Since these are not off the shelf bikes, it takes about 6 weeks from the time you place your order until its delivered. I suspect it will arrive around the middle of December or slightly earlier. I found the following Penny-Farthing article informative and thought you might like to read about them.





Penny-Farthing

The Penny-Farthing, also known as a high wheel, high wheeler or ordinary, is an early type of bicycle. It was popular in the 1870s and 1880s, with its large front wheel providing high speeds, owing to it travelling a large distance for every rotation of the legs, and comfort,

because the large wheel provided greater shock absorption.

It became obsolete in the late 1880s with the development of modern bicycles, which provided similar speed, via a chain-driven gear train, and comfort, from the use of pneumatic tires. They were marketed as "safety bicycles" because of the greater ease of mounting and dismounting, the reduced danger of falling, and the reduced height to fall, in comparison to penny-farthings.

The name came from the British penny and farthing coins, the penny being much larger than the farthing, so that the side view of the bicycle resembles a larger penny (the front wheel) leading a smaller farthing (the rear wheel). Although the name "Penny-Farthing" is now the most common, it was probably not used until the machines had been almost superseded. The first recorded print reference is from 1891 in *Bicycling News*. For most of their reign, they were simply known as "bicycles", and were the first machines to be so called, although they were not the first two-wheeled, pedaled vehicles. In the late 1890s, the name "ordinary" began to be used, to distinguish them from the emerging safety bicycles, and that term, along with "hi-wheel" and variants, are preferred by many modern enthusiasts.

Following the popularity of the boneshaker, Eugène Meyer, a Frenchman, invented the high-wheeler bicycle design in 1869 and fashioned the wire-spoke tension wheel. Around 1870 English inventor James Starley, described as the father of the bicycle industry, and others, began producing bicycles based on the French boneshaker but with front wheels of increasing size, because larger front wheels, up to 5 feet (152 cm) in diameter, enabled higher speeds on bicycles limited to direct-drive. In 1878, Albert Pope began manufacturing the Columbia bicycle outside Boston, starting their two-decade heyday in America.

Although the trend was short-lived, the penny-farthing became a symbol of the late Victorian era. Its popularity also coincided with the birth of cycling as a sport.

End of an era

The well-known dangers of the Penny-Farthing were, for the time of its prominence, outweighed by its strengths. While it was a difficult, dangerous machine, it was simpler, lighter, and faster than the safer velocipedes of the time. Two new developments changed this situation and led to the rise of the safety bicycle. The first was the chain drive, originally used on tricycles, allowing a gear ratio to be chosen independent of the wheel size. The second was the pneumatic bicycle tire, allowing smaller wheels to provide a smooth ride.

Operation

Mounting requires skill. The rider must first grasp the handlebar and place one foot on a peg above the back wheel. Then the rider scoots the bicycle forward to gain momentum and quickly jumps up onto the seat while continuing to steer the bicycle and maintain balance.

Although easy to ride slowly because of their high center of mass and the inverted pendulum effect, Penny-Farthings are prone to accidents. To stop, the rider presses back on the pedals while applying a spoon-shaped brake pressing the tire. The center of mass being high and not far behind the front wheel means any sudden stop or collision with a pothole or other obstruction can send the rider over the handlebars. On long downhills, some riders hooked their feet over the handlebars. This made for quick descents but left no chance of stopping. A new type of handlebar was introduced, called Whatton bars, that looped behind the legs so that riders could still keep their feet on the pedals and also be able to leap forward feet-first off the machine.
