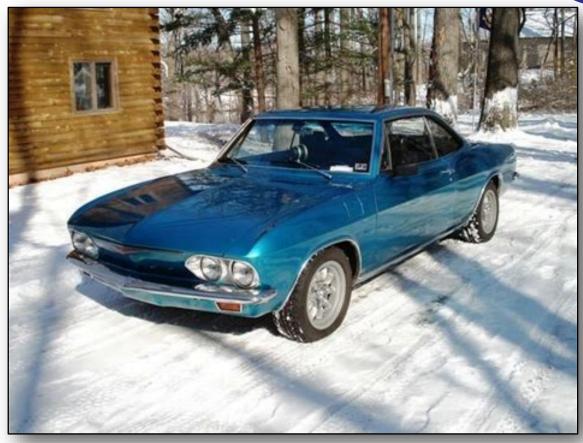

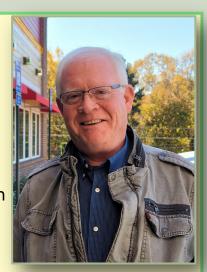

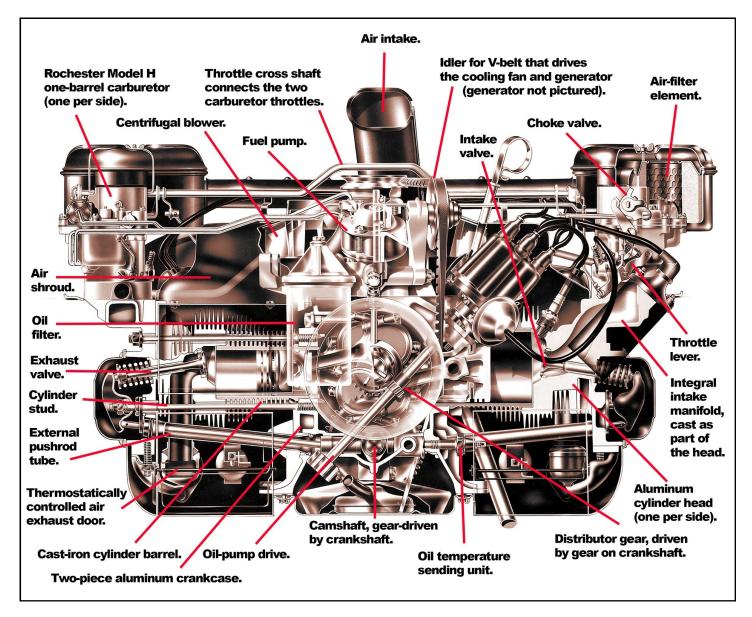

Air Cooled Engine By: Eva "Corvair Lady" McGuire

Cutaway illustration in detail of the flat six, horizontally opposed air-cooled engine of the Chevrolet Corvair. Let's appreciate what a feat of engineering this was back in the day. Vairy Cool!



Brief Background: Work for the Corvair engine began as early as 1952 when Ed Cole (then Chief Engineer at Chevrolet) wanted to create a small compact economy car with an aluminum engine that would make a lightweight vehicle.

Choosing aluminum would be a costly decision over iron as GM didn't have an aluminum plant to accommodate this need. GM made a deal in 1956 with Alcoa Reynolds Aluminum and made plans to secure a site in Massena, New York. In 1957, GM signed a deal and Chevy began to build a foundry to create Corvair engine parts. The plant was completed in 1958 and the first production parts began in April, 1959 with 70 Corvair engines being built per hour at the Tonawanda Engine Plant. Talk about a time crunch! The first Corvair car (including putting the engine together) was hand assembled at the Willow Run Assembly Plant in Ypsilanti, Michigan, by Cecil Cole (no relation to Ed Cole) beginning on May 20th, 1959, with the first production car rolling off the assembly line on July 7, 1959. The Corvair was officially introduced to the public on October 2, 1959.

Air Cooled Engine (Cont.) By: Eva "Corvair Lady" McGuire

Corvair engine fun facts: Ed Cole's inspiration and influence to develop the Corvair engine was partly based on his own personal pursuits of being a private airplane pilot during the early 1950's where he logged many hours on a Continental powered small aircraft. During this same time frame, he was working on military projects as Senior Engineer at Cadillac in 1950 and assigned to make a lightweight military tank that would involve another Continental, horizontally opposed, flat six engine.

These engines made a great impression on him that would set the stage when time came for Mr. Cole to have the final say on what power unit would be chosen for the light weight compact Corvair vehicle.

Mr. Cole developed the Corvair engine basically using the same set up as VW (rear engine and air-cooled). Despite using an aluminum block for Corvair making the car more lightweight; the engine turned out to weigh 78 more pounds than originally planned. These engines made a great impression on him that would set the stage when time came for Mr. Cole to have the final say on what power unit would be chosen for the light weight compact Corvair vehicle. Mr. Cole developed the Corvair engine basically using the same set up as VW (rear engine and air-cooled). Despite using an aluminum block for Corvair making the car more lightweight; the engine turned out to weigh 78 more pounds than originally planned.

All the Corvair engines were made at the Tonawanda Engine Plant in Tonawanda, New York, and that is why you will see the letter "T" stamped on your engine. The month and date manufactured will follow that letter "T" followed with a one, two, or three letter code (like YC, ZF, RH to signify type of engine, horsepower, whether it's a powerglide or manual, etc. To understand the breakdown on Corvair engine codes, go to https://www.tpocr.com/corvairec.html

Rebuilt Fuel Pump Fiasco! by Dan Terry

This is an Update on the rebuilt fuel pump fiasco installed in the Corsa.

As most of you know, I had a fuel pump failure last year in Sept. 2022. I have always contended that, if at one time a reliable pump could be manufactured, then there is no reason that it could not be done today. After all, there are new materials, etc.

After my pump died in September of 2022, I started looking for a replacement. I tried NAPA, OPG, and Amazon. All of them failed by 15-25 miles or upon first start up. I had heard some good things about Arthur Gould Rebuilders from other Corvair owners. I gave them a try.

Arthur Gould rebuilds fuel and water pumps for cars going back to the early 1900s. I sent in my best "dead body", a GM pump purchased from Love Chevrolet in Columbia, SC on Christmas Eve 1977. It was in my car until 1993. About two weeks later, I received it back. At first look, the actuating rod length appeared to fall between the very early style and the '62 and '69 style. I installed it anyway and drove it 4 miles to the gas station. It was already leaking.

I called them and returned it, along with a scan of the leaflet describing the differences that GM used to put in the box. This time the rod was the correct length. Since that time, it has been working without a problem for over 3,000 miles, except for having to tighten the screws about an 8th of a turn at about 2,000 miles.

If you want to stay with a mechanical pump, I would give them a try. However, I plan to get Clark's pump for a backup when it is available.

We have only been able to locate 2 manufacturers of original style Corvair fuel pumps. Since 1973, we have consistently seen 1-2% of new fuel pumps fail. From about 1998-2001, the failure rate went to nearly 10%! We finally convinced the pump manufacturer that they were using the wrong diaphragm material! Currently, about 1%-2% of the fuel pumps continue to have problems. The problems have usually been seepage of fuel or complete failure resulting in no fuel or a rupture of the main diaphragm. The main supplier (C3403) is now using "antiwicking" diaphragms & has returned to all 3 diaphragms having fabric reinforced material. We've also added a pump from a 2nd supplier (C3403A). Our experience with both is nearly identical. A spare pump is always a good idea. —See page 66 for Electric Pumps—

Corvair Purgatory By Mike Callahan

Happy January! A time of Good Cheer and welcome in another year.

So, what's going on at Corvair Pergatory this month: Things went well this month despite the coldness (repeated from last month). Spent most of the last 2 weeks working on my '58-pickup truck. I had a friend install the motor mounts and trans mount and bolt in the LS motor from a 2006 Tahoe. Installed front disc brakes and new master cylinder, new coil packs (8 of them), started installing the modified wiring harness. Need to find or make an exhaust manifold for the driver side – there's no room for the stock one – the steering box is in the way.

Gas gauge wasn't working on the red a/c conv. Found that the float was full of gas and that the rubber hose for the in-tank fuel pump had disintegrated. Turns out you need to use "submersible hose" at \$2.50 per inch.

Wired the electric seats on the white a/c car. Got the red '66 a/c convertible out and did a bunch of work on the top and interior and it is up and running. It has a rebuilt engine in it. Going to the muffler shop for a custom muffler tomorrow.

Started tracing wires on the LS car. The OBD11 module is not reading the data. Sold lots of parts, cut a '64 up for body parts and took it to the scrap yard. Price of iron is up to 7 cents vs 3.75 cents a few months ago.

Work in Progress:

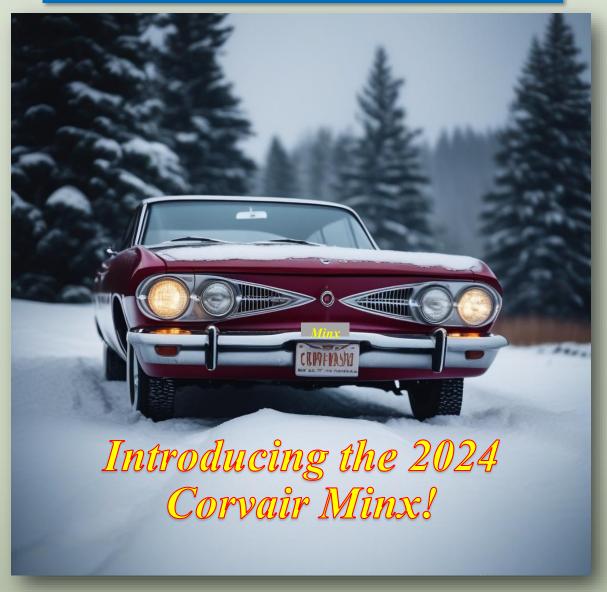
- *58 chevy apache 3200: long-bed step-side pickup truck:
 Needs: Wiring the LS motor, get computer and have it programmed, wiring the cab, order and install custom drive, electric power steering.
 Dec: LS motor and trans installed, disk brakes installed.
- '61 El Corvino: Needs: door weather stripping, carpet, other interior finishing (door panels, etc.) wire up the seat switches. Build a console to hold seat switches.
- *'68 Ultravan:* Needs: driver wiper motor stopped wiping. Find a place to install microwave ...Road time. Build tow-bar.
- *'33 Ford coupe:* Needs: interior, more wiring to straighten out, headlights, turn signals, find a way to increase ground clearance, paint.
- '66 Coupe: A/C, 4 wheel disc brakes. Needs: wiring to engine for gauges, wiring for electric seats, chrome around windshield installed, DEC: wired up seat, installed new seat switch.
- **'66 Corvair:** LS motor implant. Needs: Brakes not right, repair some body damage from garage accident, design and build a dash, interior work.... First need to get OBDII to work right, trace wiring from computer. DEC: Started to trace out wires to the OBD11 socket.
- *'62 8-Door Greenbrier* with Brown EFI. Needs: weather stripping a round all 5 of the 8 doors.
 - DEC: installed w/s on back 2 doors, now just need to finish doors 7 and 8.
- '62 Studebaker Hawk Gran Tourisimo: Needs: a/c wiring, passenger door won't shut properly.
- **'66 Red A/C convertible:** Needs: Some run time to break in new engine, a/c hooked up.
 - DEC: Did a bunch of interior work and replaced chrome pieces at the top of the windshield. Fixed fuel sending unit and gas guage.
- '66 mid-engine Ford V8 Kalmark Kit, only one known to exist. Needs: carpeting.

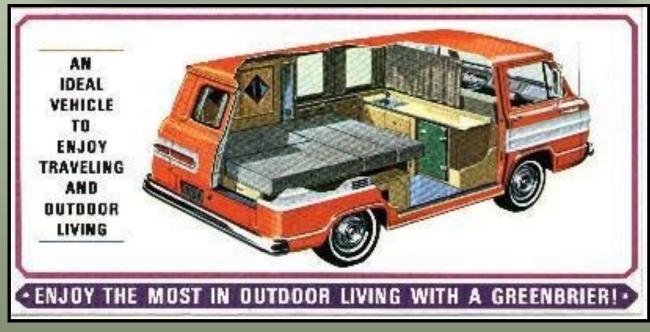

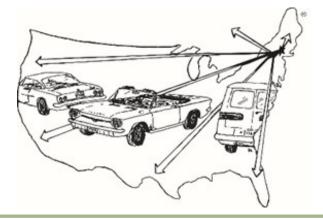
