Sooner or Later

In May we talked about safe driving practices. I tried to have a good time with it and hope folks found some things to think about. One thing I forgot to mention is to look as far ahead as possible so you're not suddenly surprised, especially out on the open road. As a car club we really should be all about safety. We used to push folks to have a fire extinguisher in their car but we haven't brought it up much in the last 10 years or so.

I've probably mentioned that I'm trying to downsize my Corvair stuff. I don't know that I'm having a fire sale yet but I'm actively moving some things along. Last year I went from 15 Corvairs to 10 and I'd like to get down to 5 this year. I've sold some used engines after getting them running and disassembled some engines for parts. I'm putting some engines together from good parts I've accumulated over the years and new owners seem to show up before I can get them finished. In a slow process I'm aiming to ease up and fade away. Maybe not tomorrow or the day after but slowly and surely. My surviving kin are not interested in Corvairs. I've had 3 Corvairs in a storage garage for some time now and I've given that up.

The last car I brought home is a '66 coupe I got for free in 1975 as a bare shell; no wheels, no glass, no nothing. I don't know how I managed to store it all these years, I remember wearing out my welcome in a few places including my parents bunk house in Annandale. I did a little work on it in the 70s and had some body work done on it in the 90s. In about 1999 I had a call from the Sheriffs Office saying they had raided the body shop out in the sticks for drugs and I better come get it or they might tie it up with drug money. It's been in epoxy primer for 25 years now. I believe I've found someone who is willing to paint it if we get the body work done. This week we started by trial fitting the trunk lid, headlights, grille and bumper in front and likewise parts in the rear. There were floor pans welded in already but we're closing up some holes and fitting the tunnel pans and such underneath. My associate is better at this stuff than I am. In the 70s I was going to paint it dark green, in the 90s I was going to paint it Aztec Bronze but now I believe I've settled in on silver with a maroon interior. My race car was silver and black so perhaps I can pay homage to that, it was a part of my soul for quite some time. I may get it running with a normal engine and switch to fuel injection soon after. I hope you won't think me crass by sawing the intake manifolds off a pair of NOS 140 heads to weld on 6 tubes. Saving these heads for someday has been folly and someday is now. 2025 will be 50 years that I've had this car and I think I need to get it done by then, anything past that might be considered excessive.

At the June meeting I'd like to talk about oil pressure. All these years I haven't had much trouble with it but it seems to have come up for more than a few of us lately. Most but not all of the variables seem to come up regarding activities in the rear housing. It's not just low oil pressure that's a problem, too much oil pressure can cause a very big mess in a very short time. I'm not sure I'm well versed on oil pressure numbers so maybe we can bandy that about a bit. Perhaps we could touch on motor oil viscosity and zinc.

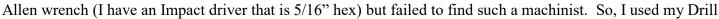
Funny story, I have a car here now that's had a knocking or rotational sound for more than a few years now. I'm not convinced that it's a rod knocking sound but I did have the oil pressure light flicker at low speed pulling into the garage which gave me pause until I figured out someone has the bulb positions switched in the dash so what I was actually seeing was the generator not charging when the engine was about to stall.

Main Jet Removal Tool

A recent article showed you my Jet Removal Tool but didn't fess-up to the clumsy way it often got stuck - down in the hole. (see pic of hole in which the Jet resides) There's an 1/8" hole in the center of the Jet that centers the original JET-Hole cutter. That hole can be used to guide the Removal Tool if a person can build a Tool with a Pin in the middle of a "screwdriver blade". I tried to find a machinist who would center a hole in the end of an



press and made a few false starts till I managed to bull my way through and got a hole drilled pretty close to the middle in the end of an Allen wrench. I carved a sheetrock screw down to nearly the size of the hole I had drilled, and set it aside.

I had to take the Temper out of the Allen Wrench to cut/drill/carve it. A



small cutoff wheel on a Dremel Tool



worked to snip away at the end of that 5//16" Allen till I had a short – Fat – square ended blade aimed right across the hole I had made. It has to be centered as the hole in the Jet is exactly in the center and that lines up perfectly with the slot for the blade of the Tool. You must have each of these ideas in mind as the carving takes place.

A lot of adjusting took place as the Tool and the Jet got closer together. In the end you can see there is such a Tool and it fits into the Jet without sliding sideways and getting stuck down in the Carburetor Bowl. Don't forget to Re-Harden (Quench in oil) the Steel. It was almost as difficult to take the pictures showing the Tool as it was to carve it, but it does fit well into the Jet and snatches the Jet out without binding.

A CORVAIR modification that requires an FC Axle as a Donor

Know your Lug Bolt Circle Diameter...How to measure it. Of particular concern is the diameter of the Lug Bolt Circle on the EM wheels, the LM wheels, and the FC wheels. You need to know they are the same diameter, so that you can believe me when I tell you they are the same! This chart shows you how to make that measurement.





The reason you want to know that these numbers are the same is so you can see there is a way to modify an EM axle to take a LM wheel. Essentially a 5-Bolt wheel on a 4- Bolt axle. An FC donor Axle is the first order of business. It's possible some other Chevrolet axle might do but I'm not certain how to cut one of them.



This is a bare FC axle. Splined on one end to accommodate the Axle Yoke (that mates

with the Differential Yoke, using a U-Joint) and flared out on the other end to make a mounting flange for the wheel's lug nuts, etc. the Wheel Bearing has been removed for the photo-op. The FC Axle flange that uses five Lug-Bolts is shown on the right – it also has the Lug-Bolts removed, ready for cutting. Photo shows where to cut the



axle flange (outside of the ridge) giving you a ring of flat steel with five holes in it. These holes will hold the new longer Lug-Bolts needed to reach through the 4-Bolt axle's flange to capture the wheel. Sounds kinda weird to say you cut off the holes!

Now remove the four Lug-Bolts from the Early Axle. To remove the old studs put the Butt end of the mounted stud over the end of a pipe and hit the stud with a sizeable hammer.



Now, using a single Lug-Bolt, attach the Donor Ring to the back of the 4-Bolt Axle's Flange. You will have to line up the two big holes used for mounting the Wheel Bearing to the A-Frame. You know this single bolt will be placed correctly because you measured the Bolt – Circle (above) and are confident of your measurement! When you have the Donor Ring's remaining four holes behind the four-bolt axle flange you can see where to drill holes to allow the new bolts to come through. You

do not drill any holes in your new FC Donor Ring! Line up the big Socket Wrench hole used to access the Bearing mounts and slip the new

Lug-Bolt into the one of the Ring's five holes that matches. Reverse a Lug-Nut (flat side in) on that single Stud and secure the two flanges together, snuggly. Snug will allow some movement to accomplish the final alignment/centering. Using the Early Wheel Bearing as a rotating mount you can center the 5-Bolt ring on the axle. Better to use a dial indicator so you know you really have the two Bolt circles directly overlapping and centered on the axle! Using the correctly positioned 5-Bolt flange, mark where the additional four holes will be



drilled in the Early flange and then drill them slightly over size (at least 0.020") so the new Lug-Bolts won't touch the EM flange as they reach through. Install all five new Bolts and verify all is well. Again, install the nuts backwards. Torque them in. Put some weldment in the empty holes. This is not critical as the five new Bolts will hold this assembly together when you are on the road so no need to worry about the strength of the welding. CAUTION! Do not weld on the new Lug-Bolts as they are now 'properly' mounted in the FC Ring's five holes.

You now have an "Early 5-Bolt Axle" to mount Late 5-Bolt wheels. Use Late hubs on the front if you want all the wheels to be the same! Or not! Just have fun while you keep on CORVAIRing! Fran Schmit
