Time sure has been flying by fast the past few months, it's hard to believe that I am writing something for the July Aircooler and it's the middle of June. Where did the past few weeks go? Some time ago the Garage Squad pulled the 61 80hp and 4 speed out of my barn find 64 and also pulled a correct 64 95hp and Powerglide out of one of the Brady bunch cars. I was able to get both of them running while still in the respective cars and they ran guite well with old spark plugs and wires, points and generators. I removed the oil pan and replaced it with a cleaned up used pan and new gasket, refilled with new oil and filter, Pete K. rebuilt the original car carbs, I removed the top tin and cleaned up 49 years of mouse nest and droppings. The original fuel pumped worked with a line going to a boat tank with fresh Rec 90 fuel and did not leak like the new Chinese ones that are now being produced. The donner engine had sat for about 12? years, it started without rebuilding the carbs or changing the oil pan. I just wanted to see if it would run and after a while it cleared up and runs well. That engine and trans now sits on the shop floor and will be installed soon as I have been busy getting things ready for the BttB Promo Tour and going on said tour for 6 days. One rainy day I replaced the rear and center brake lines, rubber hoses, fuel line front to back and removed the 4-speed shifter and shift rod as it is going to be going back to an automatic set up as it came out of the factory. Someone years ago, converted it to a 4 speed.


FB Marketplace is My Nemesis! By Pete Koehler



The Saga of the only surviving Fuel Injected Prototype Corvair Engine By Pete Koehler

Back in the early 1960's Chevrolet was experimenting with ways to improve the performance of the Corvair flat six cylinder engine. Fuel Injection was tried. Supercharging and turbocharging were also investigated. In the end turbocharging was the answer and the other ideas were dropped. The prototype fuel injection parts were also dropped, probably in a dumpster at or near the GM Tech Center in Warren, Michigan. This was around 1964-5 as some of the injectors had casting dates between 1962 and 1964.

Jumping ahead about ten years these same parts resurfaced in California. They were acquired by club members for a few hundred dollars (\$500?) and sat in boxes for almost another ten years. Larry Claypool of the Chicago club and I had the crazy idea to put together a fuel injected engine with these bits. The plan was to send the completed project to Michigan and the first-ever Corvair-only Museum display at the Sloan Museum in Flint. This was in 1986. The engine had complete internals, but the FI parts were just for show.

After the six-month run at the Sloan the engine went back into storage. I think it may have been part of an early Corvair Preservation Foundation (CPF) Museum attempt in Virginia.

That was a short-term arrangement with a local building owner.

The next time the FI engine surfaced it was to be part of a multi-city tour and displayed with other CPF artifacts in 2010. Before that started Clark Hartzel and I rebuilt the display making it lighter and easier to move around by gutting the block. It still looked like an engine but had no crank or cam or pistons and the heads were empty as well. Clark added new velocity stacks that were not true to the original design, but they were shiny!

The last time that the prototype Corvair FI engine was under our control was at the 2014 Back to the Bricks event in Flint. Famous drag racer Don Garlits from Ocala, Florida was paid to be a feature at the event. He brought one of his original slingshot dragsters for display. At the end of the event the Corvair FI engine was loaded into his trailer and headed South. What happened after that is a matter that not everyone is in agreement with. We thought we were loaning the engine to Don for display in his museum since we didn't have a museum of our own at that time. Proper paperwork wasn't completed and without it ownership is being questioned. At least the engine is on display and the story can be told and seen by the general public. It would be nice to get it back and proudly put it on display in the CPF Museum in Illinois. Unfortunately, that might not happen in my lifetime Don Garlitis is still active and at just north of 90 I say good for him! If he has a change of heart we might see our engine back in our hands. Whatever happens this story has a better ending than if the prototype parts were scrapped way back in 1964 as GM had intended. ■

Chevrolet Corvair's gone, but not forgotton

Brandon Twp.- By today's standards, Ray Dubia's ride to work is minuscule compared to the behemoths that now cruise America roads. But what the Chevrolet Corvair lacks in size it makes up for in uniqueness and automobile history.

Dubia, is the owner of 1961 Model 700 Corvair he purchased from California about five years ago with about 40,000 miles on the odometer.


"There's no salt on the roads, so the rust was not a problem with the 60 year old car," said Dubia. "However, the sun really baked the interior so, that had to be replaced when it was restored."

The Corvair was very basic—powered by an 80 horsepower, 145 cubic inch six cylinder, two carburetor air cooled engine, and a two speed Powerglide automatic transmission. The four tube AM radio kicks out the tunes.

"The rear engine/trans-axle provides great traction until you get about 8 inches of snow," he said. "Then the bottom of the car drags you down. Still I drive it everyday and it draws plenty of looks from others."

Costing about \$2,000 new in the early 1960s, General Motors Corvair design took aim at the economy Ford Falcon, VW and Plymouth Valiant cars. To save on weight, in 1960 GM moved toward all aluminum heads and blocks, but added steel sleeves in the cylinders. With the rear engine design the front of the car is know as a "frunk," a much needed space due to the smaller interior.


"Actually, the backseat folds forward and creates some decent room," he said. "I've driven to Sault Ste. Marie and Texas with no problems cruising at 70 mph—I've even had the car up to 100 mph with no issues."





Still, safety concern of the Corvair and legal fallout lead to its demise in the late 1960s, just a decade after production started it ended. From beginning the car was scrutinized by political activist Ralph Nader. The first chapter of his 1965 book, "Unsafe at Any Speed," focused on the Corvair's rear suspension design, a swing-axle concept similar to the VW Beetle. Nader reported, the design could tuck the outside rear tire under hard cornering, causing the car to roll. Dubia said the 13-inch-by-5 inch wide tires require 31 pounds of pressure in the rear tires and 21 inch in the back.

"The tire pressure was key in the issues with the Corvair," he said. "I've never had any problems with the four Corvairs I've owned. It's a great car and a big piece of history."


