

GROCERY-STORE ITEMS YOU CAN USE ON YOUR CAR

There are times when you just can't get to a parts store. Maybe it's 10 p.m., and you've bashed your oil pan on a curb. Or perhaps you've got a late-night craving to rebuild a carb, and the only thing open in your town is the 24-hour Food n' Stuff. Not only do grocery stores carry some great makeshift versions of supplies you'd normally use on your car, but they also stock some must-have products you won't find at your average parts store. Here are 10 grocery-store buys that can help you clean up, make your life easier, or get out of a jam.



S.O.S. Pads: These are just steel wool embedded with soap, but they work for getting the toughest corrosion and grime from just about anything you don't mind them scratching up. Don't forget Scotch-Brite pads, either. They are abrasive and can scratch, but they get into tight places and soak up the nastiest of gunk.



Aluminum Foil: Since aluminum is softer than chrome, it can remove road grime and corrosion without any scratching. When you're spray painting, foil works great for masking off oddly shaped pieces that would otherwise take a ton of tape. And who hasn't made a "fuse" with a wad of Reynolds Wrap? We're not done with aluminum just yet, either.



Aluminum Pans: These make great drain pans or parts washers. They're just about the perfect size for cleaning up a carb, they're cheap, and after you've used them a few times, they're recyclable. All you need now is some sort of cleaner and something to scrub with. Hmmmmm.



Toothpaste: Toothpaste is mostly made up of abrasives, so it can be used to polish things besides your teeth. We've seen it do olgate emarkable stuff to oxidized plastic headlight housings. Bonus: Old toothbrushes make great parts brushes, but not the other way around.



Kitty Litter: Cat-box sand is dry clay that will absorb a spill, making it much easier to clean up. You can even throw some in a cloth bag under your seat to absorb moisture from the air and help rid the odor of a musty car interior. Charcoal briquettes also work well for absorbing odors, but you'll be tempted to grill with them.



Beer: You can't buy beer at Pep Boys or O'Reilly (which seems like a cross-marketing fail of epic scale). All you need are a few beers to lure your buddies over and your best Tom Sawyer impression to convince them that working on your car is so much fun they should join in, and you've got your own pit crew. If it's a particularly tough job or they did really well, fire up those briquettes you didn't stash under your seat, and treat them to something from the butcher counter.



Cola: There are a number of uses for cola. First off, the bottle itself makes a decent funnel. Thanks in part to its fizzy goodness but mostly its phosphoric acid content, cola also makes a solid makeshift cleaner. Pour a bit on battery terminals to remove corrosion or use it to remove corrosion from a bumper by pouring a bit on a wadded up ball of aluminum foil.



Easy-Off Oven Cleaner: Here's some of the nastiest cleaning sauce you'll find in a grocery store, and we mean that in a good way. It contains lye and will eat up grease and gunk with the best of 'em. It's also good at removing anodizing from aluminumand etch-polished surfaces, so watch what you spray.



Comet: We can't talk abrasives without mentioning Comet. It's like powdered polishing compound for a thrashed paint job that's only worth spending \$1.99 fixing.

Baby Powder: Just a bit of powder on a squeaky fan belt will silence it almost as fast as turning the engine off. It also helps for putting on nitrile or latex gloves (which you can also buy at the grocery store).

More:

- We've heard pepper can be used as a radiator stop-leak. We've never seen that work but have had success with crunchedup Fritos.
- A bar of soap can be rubbed on a crack in a gas tank to stop a small leak.
- Wet Ones are almost as good as shop rags.
- Plastic garbage bags are great for masking. Also great for putting over engines on stands!
- Small parts can be stored in Ziploc sandwich bags
- Tide and other clothes detergents work pretty well for scrubbing oil stains on concrete
- Ivory dishwashing soap is good for color sanding.

Corvair Tech Tips

Headlight "On" Warning

Did you ever switch the ignition off and leave the headlights on? Me neither...must have been some other reason the batter was low. Ahem! With today's automobiles one simply has to put the key or smart stick in the ignition slot, then aim and accelerate, the thinking is done. With our Corvairs it's a different world...ya' gotta drive them and coddle them. It's no wonder Corvair headlights get left on every now and then. My goal was to incorporate one of the modern vehicle niceties into the Corvair without it being too noticeable.

The circuitry is quite simple. If one can find a wire that, when the headlight switch is on or at a higher voltage than the ignition circuitry when the ignition switch is off, we solved the problem. On my '66 there are such wires and all Corvair wiring is the same or quite similar. Taking advantage of modern electronics, one can install a piezo-electric between the headlight wiring and the ignition wires. The piezo-electric device has several advantages, one being low current draw. But more importantly it is polarity sensitive (the red buzzer wire must be positive when the black wire is negative or grounded). Here is what happens. When both switches are off, there is no voltage present to activate the buzzer. When both switches are on, both circuits are at the same +12 volts so no current flows. When the headlight switch is on and the ignition switch is off, current can flow from the headlight circuit through the buzzer to ground in the ignition circuit. Lastly, when the ignition switch is on and the headlight switch is off, the piezo-electric device will not conduct in this direction (black wire positive), hence no buzz.

Electrically here is what one needs to do. Find a headlight wire which is "hot" when and only when the lights are on. The #12 black wire with a light blue stripe that runs between the headlight switch and the dimmer switch will do just fine. It is conveniently located near the headlight switch. The next challenge is to find a wire which is likewise "hot" only when the ignition switch is on. Lo and behold, the #18 tan wire running from the top of the fuse block to the turn signal blinker/flasher is just the ticket. This wire also runs near the headlight switch.

Now for the piezo-electric buzzer. This little crystal is quite unique. If stimulated by an external voltage it changes physically which can produce sound, and, if given a sharp hit, it will generate electricity. (If you have a gas barbecue grill on your deck, chances are it has a piezo-electric crystal which generates the ignition spark when you push the button.) The white buzzer in the photo produces an interrupted lower frequency buzz, while the black one gives off a steady 3,500 Hz sound. Your choice, just be sure to get the type rated for 12 volts DC. Others require a separate electronic driver.



These piezo-electric buzzers weight very little so a nylon cable tie will anchor it satisfactorily. The major problem for me was getting myself under the dash and doing the connector crimping. My 1965 rag-top now has one of these buzzers and it works. The idea is really much simpler than it sounds. After all you have just two wires and two connections to make...try it!

Tech Editor, Larry Claypool notes: The buzzer can be located at the fuse box. Connect the positive buzzer wire to the panel lamp spade connector on 1960-66 or "ign" terminal on 1967-69. This provides the correct inputs for a headlamp warning, and also allows one to override the buzzer by simply dimming the panel lights.

- Two recent Internet hacks have been reported, both involving CCE members:
 - 010101010100101010101010101010 One incident involved a suspicious email from Chris George, a new CCE member, containing an RSVP invitation without event details. Upon investigation, it was revealed that Chris' email address list had been compromised.
 - The other case was an email from Joseph Day, a deceased CCE member, thanking for a payment made in Ethereum cryptocurrency via PayPal. This transaction was false, leading to the discovery of a scam using Joseph's name.
- Tips to stay safe from such scams:
 - Avoid clicking on any links or calling numbers in questionable emails.
 - Beware of scams using familiar names to deceive you.
 - Stay cautious and do not disclose personal information to unknown sources.
- Additional incidents mentioned:
 - A fake request for money from Lin Parro, claiming to be stranded in London, was debunked by a simple phone call.
 - Bogus emails requesting emergency funds from the late Bo Loster were reported, highlighting the importance of securing email accounts.

Remember, the internet stores information permanently, so always exercise caution online.


Secretary's Report:

 MiLana Wright, the Secretary, read the club minutes, thanking Fred Witmer for filling in last month.


New Business:

- The meeting was adjourned with a motion from Jeff Ostroff, seconded by Paul Miller.


