Strangest Chevrolets Ever Made are being Ranked

I settled down to start working on the November newsletter for CPCC. While I waited for the internet to finish loading, I noticed an article on the first page titled, "10 Of the Strangest Chevrolets Ever Built, Ranked," written by Justin Owen on the SlashGear website. My curiosity arose, I clicked on it to discover which cars made the list, and there it was... #1 the Corvair!

The article begins by mentioning the arrival of the West German Volkswagen in the United States. Initially, it didn't take the country by storm as an import sensation, but thanks to the groundbreaking "Think Small" advertising campaign in the early 1960s, sales skyrocketed. In response to this growing competition, Chevrolet introduced the Corvair in 1960. The Corvair was equipped with an air-cooled boxer engine located in the rear, making it cost-effective to produce and easy to maintain. While the Corvair's styling was unique and it was offered in various forms, including sedans, trucks, and wagons, it was a close resemblance to the Beetle.

The Corvair enjoyed a successful ten-year run, with Chevrolet selling hundreds of thousands of them, establishing it as a popular model that still has a dedicated fan base today. It's also an fascinating vehicle that can be enhanced with the proper tuning and modifications. While few would label it as strange, it does stand out, particularly because it originated from Chevrolet. Known for producing conventional cars with front-mounted, water-cooled inline engines and traditional American designs, the Corvair is indeed an offbeat in the Chevrolet's lineup. Following the discontinuation of the boxer engine, no other air-cooled engines have been manufactured since. In the context of Chevrolet's traditional design and manufacturing practices, the Corvair is undeniably a unique car.





The Preventative Maintenance Series

This month will be an attempt to help diagnose noises from the rear of the car. Drive train noises also apply to FC vehicles.

A rolling noise that does not change in pitch from acceleration to deceleration in the same speed range is usually a wheel bearing. Wheel bearings on early models usually squeak or make a cycling growl. Late bearings will squeak, make a raspy noise or howl.

A clank when starting from a stop or going into gear may be a U-joint. They can also make a clinking noise, usually at low speed. Loose axle yokes on early models and FC can make the same noise.

Howling that changes noticeably between acceleration deceleration is either a worm-out pinion gear, mismatched ring and pinion gear or very loose or worn-out pinion bearings.

Thunking noises on late models can be either the top or bottom shock mount. Check for shifted lower bushings or rusted top mounting pads. The latter can be repaired.

Squeaking from one side of a late model going over bumps can be a trailing arm bushing that has popped out of its shell. The arm is rubbing on the bracket, and the tire is way out of toe alignment.

A heavy thump or clunk going over a quick rise may be a separated motor mount on a 1965 model. The other models make less noticeable noises unless almost terminal. Best to check them every time you change oil filters if they are original.

A loud squawk that occurs briefly as you push in or release the clutch is a pilot busing problem. Alway replace it any time the transaxle is separated as they take a set very quickly.

A knocking noise at idle which disappears or gets quieter when depressing the clutch is a flywheel with loose rivets (all years, all models of manual transmissions).

A squeal or light rattling noise that is only noticed when holding down on the clutch pedal is a clutch release bearing.

PUSHROD

The following article was posted in the Corvair Center Forum on May 20, 2017

Here is a pushrod tube removal tool made from inexpensive hardware items. This tool fits inside the tube and grasps the interior of the tube by swelling the rubber stopper. An added bonus is that tightening the nut that swells the rubber stopper also imparts torque to the tool, which twists the tube free of the engine.

Parts List: 1/4-20 X 6" carriage bolt 1/4" ID X 1/2" OD X 1"L Nylon spacers (2)


Vega Fuel Pump for Corvairs



Electric fuel pumps. We've all read articles about replacing the Corvair's mechanical fuel pump with a modern electric fuel pump. The experts recommend mounting them next to the gas tank, at the front-end of the car, in a protected location. Clark's offers a complete electric fuel pump kit on Page 66 of its catalog.

My buddy, Brian O'Neill, prefers an in-tank fuel pump. He's had one in his Corvair for the past eighteen years and it hasn't failed yet. And unlike the external pumps, it's completely silent. He's now in the process of rebuilding a 1961 Monza Sedan. So, once again, he's going with an in-tank pump.

Brian got the idea from the CORSA Tech Guide. It has an article about installing a Chevy Vega electric fuel pump in a Corvair. The same article also appeared in the February 1987 issue of the <u>CORSA Communique</u>. Yes, the Vega fuel pump was an in-tank unit. And they are still available at your friendly local auto parts store.
