Hello everybody!

Well, it's time for me to write my last From The President article. It has been an interesting two years, and I think we have accomplished quite a bit.

One of my biggest concerns was the year to year depletion of our treasury—we had been running approximately \$2,500 per year in expenses, and that had been going on for years, ever since we ended the



Orphan Auto Picnic and the Morris Car Show no longer wanted to hire judges for their event, as their own budget had taken a major hit.

We solved that problem by identifying what our major expenses were (namely, the *Airhorn*) and focused on possible solutions. It had been suggested over the years that we could save a bundle by sending the *Airhorn* out electronically, but we had resisted that, as there were a number of members who had no email account.

That issue had largely gone away, as most of our people had acquired email, so we decided to split the difference—charge what printing and postage cost us, and offering free online copies of our newsletter to those members who were OK with a

PDF. Our regular dues pretty much covered our other expenses, like hall rental and the like.

Subsequently, the Board decided that we might be able to further reduce our expense by purchasing a printer, and forgoing the use of a commercial print service. Over time that should provide a significant additional cost savings.

Our activities had also taken a major hit due to COVID. Fortunately, that crisis has passed, and we have been gradually increasing the "fun stuff", and our tours have been growing in attendance.

I have been honored to serve our club as president. This outfit has provided much to me, personally, over the many years (I joined in 1971), and I took my responsibilities seriously to preserve and extend the life of this organization.

Our new Board of Directors looks like an excellent one. Former president Jeff Wentz is back on the board, as is my wife (and club Activities Chair) Lin Parro. Kevin Kloker and Paul Polster will carry-over from last year's BOD, and John DeProva, one of our new members, will complete the board. Well, that's is for me, for now. I thank all of you for your support, especially when I was undergoing a bit of a health crisis, and I am glad to have fulfilled my duties.

Greetings everyone. For those that don't know, I purchased a 1966 Monza convertible in September. A few weeks after that the fuel pump started gushing gas near it's base. Two other fuel pumps were tried and they also leaked. I decided to ask Larry Claypool if we could do a Garage Squad using my car, to which he agreed.



One of the projects that the squad will do is to install an electric fuel pump. This car has a turbo block with 140 horse heads, thus using four carburetors. Ramblings from your Humble Editor—

Correction: Last month (October) a number of *Airhorns* that were printed and mailed had a month of "September" instead of "October" on the first page. This was corrected on the PDF versions of the October *Airhorn*. I apologize for the error. Because the October *Airhorn* had to be delivered to members a week earlier because of the inclusion of ballots for the Board of Directors Election, I had to start building the *Airhorn* during the end of the month of September and I keyed in "September" on the front page of the *Airhorn*. Rather then incur the expense of reprinting and remailing the October *Airhorn*, the printed and mailed *Airhorns* went out with the wrong month on the first page.

The Cost of Printing the Airhorn: As noted in Kirk Parro's From the President article in this Airhorn. one of the greatest expenditures in this club last year has been printing and mailing the Airhorn. We were paying a commercial printer to print the Airhorn in black and white, for all members. Our average cost last year for printing the Airhorn was an average of \$190 per month.

At the January 2024 CCE board meeting, Treasurer Mike Charewicz said,

"Mike Charewicz proposed printing hardcopy *Airhorns* on our own four-color laser printer. A 12-page *Airhorn* would cost about 24 cents to print using our own printer compared to about \$2 using a commercial vendor. Right now, we mail about 70 *Airhorns*. This proposal may save the club up to \$2,000 per year! Mike shared the pros and cons of printing the *Airhorn* "in-house" versus our current commercial printing vendor."

The board then took the following action:

"Kirk Parro motioned to purchase a four-color laser printer to be installed at Charley's house. Paul Polster seconded, and some discussion followed. We approved purchasing a four-color laser printer with a four-year warranty for a total cost of approximately \$600. Charley will bill CCE for paper and toner as needed."

On February 1, I purchased a Canon four color printer for \$560 from Office Depot and charged it back to CCE. I installed it in my house and installed the printer drivers on my computers. I then began to print all *Airhorns* that were to mailed to users. These were printed in full color.

In the nine months of printing the *Airhorn* in house since the Canon printer was installed, we have saved approximately \$1710 that would have been otherwise paid to the commercial printer. This covers the original cost of the printer plus a \$176 new set of toner cartridges. At the rate we are printing *Airhorns*, a set of toner cartridges is expected to last 15 months.

We are currently printing about 30 copies of the *Airhorn* per month. An additional approximately 10 copies are printed as editing proofs and for distribution at board and general membership meetings.

Mailing Costs of the *Airhorn*: I have been monitoring the dates of proposed increases in postage stamps. Just before a postal increase, I purchase six to eight months of postage stamps. Because stamps are "Forever" stamps, they can be used even if after the dates of postal rate increases. It is no longer necessary to buy a bunch of one or two cent stamps to make up for the postal increase.

Election Wrap-Up: Out of 203 ballots delivered to members, 58 were cast and counted. There were no invalid ballots. Two were returned by the post office because those members had move and not filed new addresses with the club. Three were delivered in the mail to me after the date of the CCE meeting where ballots were counted. The number of votes for each candidate were such that the late ballots would not have affected the outcome.

The new board of directors, consisting of John DiProva, Kevin Kloker, Lin Parro, Paul Polster and Jeff Wentz, will take office as of the November 13 board meeting.

Stock Is... Articles: There are two Stock Is... articles in this *Airhorn*. The one on Exterior Trim was supposed to run last month, but that issue was full. So, two are being run this month. The second one is on Mirrors. including the rarely seen remote mirrors. If you are restoring a Corvair to CORSA Concours Factory Stock condition, these are the details you must pay attention to.

Stock Is...

Larry Claypool

[This article was originally printed in the March 1987 issue of the CCE Airhorn. Larry has updated it to contain information as of 2024.]

Exterior Trim

Last time our look at what's stock got as far as trim on the lower sides of our favorite car. This month we'll try to finish off the sides completely.

Emblems—A variety of die cast emblems and scripts were used on various Corvair models. All the emblems are the same left and right except the 1963 and 1964 700 series emblem, and all of them require holes in the fenders for mounting except the 1969 500 emblem which glues on.

1960 models used a block letter CORVAIR emblem on each front fender, just ahead of the wheel wells. Monza models additionally use a Monza 900 emblem at the lower rear corner of each front fender. The 1960-61 Monza emblems might be considered "upside down" from the more traditional Monza crest, as the "wings" of the emblem extend out near the top rather than from the bottom.

Starting in '61, each model began to use its own series identification. Most emblems were accented with blue, red, gold, black, or white paint. Almost every year through '66 featured slight revisions on the theme.

I'll forgo detailed descriptions of each emblem, as that would add at least 18 paragraphs that I don't have the time to write. A quick Internet search of the Clark's catalogue can get you to the emblems page where you can look at pictures of the various ones used.

Aside from having the right emblem on the right car, classifiers note **where** the emblem is. We don't take a tape measure to your fender, but obvious misplacement would be a modification.

Belt Line Trim—Body peak or "beltline" trim is used on 700 series models. Beltline trim fully circles '60 and '61 sedans and coupes, and misses only the tailgate of wagons.

For '62 and '63, belt trim extends rearward only as far as the middle of the front doors.

All of the '60-'63 belt trim is rounded, smooth, stainless steel with a slight peak in the middle.

For '64, the only survivor in the 700 series received new belt chrome. It is wider than the trim used previously and has a depression in the middle to make its overall appearance flatter. In a turnabout of previous evolution, the '64 trim encircles all of the body except the front hood. Its construction was changed to anodized aluminum.

Belt chrome was not available on 500's or Monzas, except the '62 Monza wagon, which is trimmed identically to a '62 700 wagon.

Late models did not use any belt trim, but the '65 Corsa did have a pinstripe as standard equipment. This painted pinstripe is 1/16" wide, and it is located 1/8" below the peak of the beltline. It extends from the cove moldings in the rear all the way around towards the front and across the front edge of the hood. Pinstripe colors vary according to the interior/exterior color combination. A red car, for example, with a black interior

has a black stripe. A cypress green car with a saddle interior has a saddle stripe. There were some defaults when a car was ordered with the same exterior/interior colors such as a black car with black interior would have a red stripe. A yellow car always had a black stripe regardless of interior color. Eventually, 7 pinstripe colors were used—White, Black, Fawn, Saddle, Red, Dark Aqua, and Med. Blue. It is believed that early production cars had only Red, White or Black stripes, with the others being phased in. This was the only model and year a painted pinstripe was used on a Corvair and was not available on any other year/model.

Window Trim—Rain gutter chrome was used on all models except 500's, which were left painted. Early model Monza coupes and sedans additionally use stainless steel trim on the door glass frames, roof "B" posts, roof "C" posts of sedans, and quarter window frames of coupes. Stainless trim is also used on the windshield and rear windows of all models except the early 500's; they just use a plain black rubber gasket.

Door Edge Guards—Door edge guards were dealer-installed accessories for all Corvair cars. Early guards start below the belt line; late guards start about 7 inches above it. Guards used through '67 are held on by tiny clips. The '68 -'69 guards are slightly thinner in width, but of thicker construction; they don't use any clips at all.

Dimension wise, the early guards are 1/4" wide, the '65-'67 are 5/16" wide, and '68-'69 are 3/16". Since dealers often had guards left over from previous years, and since the late 2-door styles interchange, lots of '68-'69 cars ended up with the '65-'67 pieces. That, of course, would not be stock. All the guards, by the way, are stainless steel.

Gas Door Guard—Another popular accessory is the gas door guard, and this item, especially on earlies, gets some folks in trouble. The early guard is half-moon shaped, and it sits at the bottom of the gas door opening. There is also a full-circle door guard, but this is an aftermarket item not offered by Chevrolet; it's not considered stock. Lates use a backward "L" shaped guard. It was also made in the aftermarket, these being less defined (i.e.—"flatter") than the genuine Chevrolet item. The Chevy gas guards were both of stainless.

Mirrors

Recap—Before we finish off the sides of our favorite car, let's back up a story or two to the piece on wheel covers. A few sentences were mistakenly omitted which described the 1960 Monza wheel covers.

The Monza, of course, was the super-deluxe midyear addition to the Corvair coupe line. In keeping with the upscale approach, wheel covers were specified for the Monza instead of the hub caps used on lesser models. The Monza covers featured a turbine-like outer edge with a smooth, peaked center section. Right in the middle is a red triangle with a Chevy bowtie highlighted above and below with blue. This wheel cover was

not available on other Corvair models, and was used for the short run of 1960 Monzas only, making it comparatively rare today. The same style of cover (less the bowtie, of course) was resurrected for the Pontiac Vega (Astre, really) some fifteen years later. By the way, both '60 and '61-wheel covers are held on by the dimples in the steel wheel itself rather than prongs on the wheel cover. Thus, if your life isn't complete without '60 Monza wheel covers on your '64 Spyder, it *really* won't be complete without a set of '60- '61 wheels to hold them on with!

Mirrors—Our last "Stock Is..." promised to look at outside rear-view mirrors. This turned out to be another case of "the more you know, the less you know". Mirrors. Simple, huh? That's what I thought at first!

Before we take a year by year look, it's important to remember that outside mirrors did not become standard equipment until 1966, so if your pre-'66 Vair doesn't have one at all, that would be stock, too.

1960—The '60 Corvair mirror is the same one used on 1959-60 full size Chevrolets. It has, expectedly, a 50's themed look to it. The base of the mirror is wide, and its "neck" slopes forward to the head. The base is held on to its bracket by one screw placed horizontally from the front. The mirror head is comparatively thick, so the actual glass portion ends up about midway through the mirror's overall length. A tiny Chevy bowtie emblem is cast into the front side of the mirror head, the bowtie being recessed and with a sandcast finish.

1961—Two mirrors were totally new with a trimmer, modern look. The base was thinned up, and the slope of the neck reversed towards the rear of the car. The base is held on with one exposed vertical screw at the front edge, and a hidden vertically placed screw *under* the base. The mirror head was thinner, too, but the top of it is wider than the bottom to give a hooded appearance. The bowtie and glass size remained the same as '60.

1963, 1964, 1965—New mirrors appeared in '63. The base was streamlined to a long teardrop shape at the door, with the neck continuing this shape upward. A pod, resembling a jet aircraft engine, sits atop the neck, and the mirror head attaches at the back of the pod. The head itself is thinner than in '62, and uniformly thin all the way around. The Chevy bowtie was enlarged and changed to an outline only; the center is smooth chrome as is the rest of the head. Attachment to the separate mounting bracket is by one horizontal screw from the rear of the base. This style mirror would be used unchanged for '64 and '65.

1966, 1967—1966 found the outside driver side mirror standard for the first time, and slightly revised. The base was squared off at its ends, and the jet engine-like pod lost its castin accents to become smooth. The mirror mounting and head remained as before. This style mirror was used again in '67.

1968, 1969—A minor change for '68 found the bowtie removed from the mirror head. Otherwise, it was the same as in '66-'67. The '68 mirror continued unchanged into 1969.

The regular driver side mirror can also be installed on the passenger side and was offered as such as a dealer installed accessory. Back 'in the day' a passenger side mirror was not common on lower priced cars, yet today we see many older collector cars with both doors so adorned. I think we've simply become accustomed to the standard dual mirrors on all our

'modern' cars and thus many of the RH installation were done at the hands of today's collectors rather than the selling dealer 60 years ago.

All the standard outside rear view mirrors have been reproduced so availability is actually pretty good. The fact that those mirrors are also used on other Chevrolet models helped drive the volume up, so prices are quite reasonable. Some include the dealer installation templates to correctly position the mirror on the door, which as you might imagine, is rather important—get it wrong and the mirror head may interfere with the vent window or place it out of its range of adjustment to actually see anything useful out of it. Like most all imported things these days, quality varies, with droopy mirror heads the common complaint.

Remote Control Mirrors—Well, if that seemed simple, I guess it was compared with the extra-cost remote control mirrors that became available beginning with the 1964 models.

Corvairs were not often equipped with remote mirrors, so it's no surprise there's confusion over which one's which. Add to that dealers that installed whatever mirror was in stock at the time, plus first and second design models and you've got a classic case of concours classification confusion!

Let's try to give some relief.

A driver's side remote mirror first became available as either a factory or dealer installed option for 1964 models. The base was teardrop shaped like the regular '64 mirror, but wider to accommodate the cables and to cover the hole needed in the door. The neck slopes rearward, but not nearly as far as the regular mirror. The top of the neck ends in a large round disk that the mirror head fits against. A somewhat unusual feature is that the entire head moves with the control knob, instead of just the glass within the head. The head is deeply dished to match the neck and to facilitate movement between them. The base is held to the door by one horizontal screw (an Allen head, of all things!) from the rear. The control inside the car is a simple oval plate with a knob in the middle, and two Phillips head screws hold the control to the door. The plate is chrome, while the knob is black plastic. The control mounts on the metal door frame, just above the window crank handle. This is the first design 1964 mirror; it is part number 910472, and the accessory package is 995986.

The mirror was revised in February of 1964 to include a small Chevy bowtie at the back of the base, just above the mounting screw. The bowtie is raised on the surface rather than being recessed into it. This second design is part #910792.

Additional changes were made to the cable mechanism at various times, but the external appearance remained the same.

For 1965 the remote mirror returned as an option.

While the mirror itself remained as in '64, the control assembly was upgraded with a chromed knob, styled to match the dash knobs, The screws holding the control to the door frame were now hidden by the chrome bezel, which now snapped over the top of the control instead of being a preassembled part of it.

This style mirror continued through most of 1966. Around March of that year, the mirror was completely redesigned. On this one the head remained stationary while only the glass itself moved with the control. The base remained teardrop shaped at the front but had three flat surfaces at the rear. The single


retaining screw comes in at a slight angle from the top. The head is fairly deep, necessitated by the need to move the glass within. No bowtie appears on either the base or head. The inside control knob remained as in '65–'66, but the bezel was changed to a simple round nut (like an ignition switch bezel nut). This late ~66 mirror continued through the 1967 model year. This style was also offered as a universal replacement item by Chevrolet for all '64–'67 Corvairs, but the supplied control assembly is like the '65-early '66 unit. It was available through the Chevy parts counter as late as 1985.

1968 brought another new remote mirror to Corvairs. The base was simplified a bit to form a teardrop at the front and a flat edge at the back. One horizontal screw from the rear holds it on. The mirror head was again fixed to the base, but the shape—rectangular—was all new. Again, only the glass moved within. No bowtie emblem was used. The control assembly was also revised this year, abandoning the previous round shape in favor of a square bezel. The control knob was made less fancy (again to match the dash knobs). Mounting location in the door remained the same as before.

Corvair's final year saw yet another remote mirror used. Although appearing the same as '68, the '69 mirror has a water drain slot at the bottom of its head. The angle at which the head sits caused water to collect in the bottom, so if the temperature drops below freezing, the ice prevents adjustment of the mirror. Thus, the purpose of the drain is obvious.

Today's aftermarket does have the late 66/67 style remote mirror as well as the 68/69 style available (listed for Chevelle—same mirror). *Exact* details may not be correct for each year, but general appearance is close.

No right-side remote mirrors were ever offed for the Corvair. Although you could certainly add a manual RH mirror to a car with a remote LH unit, a regular right-side mirror looks a bit odd since it doesn't quite match the left one. This is especially so in '68 and '69 when the remote is rectangular and the regular right mirror is round. A regular LH manual mirror from the 68/69 full size Chevrolet is rectangular and will acceptably match the LH remote 68/69 Corvair mirror, but technically it's not 'stock', only because Chevrolet never listed it be used on the Corvair.

complete Clark's interior kit (off white), carpet, door arm rests, interior door and window control cranks, add on center arm rest and storage compartment that matches the interior, Standard AM radio (needs work), Door sill trim, Trunk repainted, Car cover, Floors wire brushed and treated with a "rust stop" product and then painted with two coats of rust preventive paint, Floors and the center tunnel have been covered with "hush mat" type insulating material (this car stays warm inside when it's cold!!).

Needless to say, we refurbished most everything as the work progressed. Engine "tins" were bead blasted and painted with black high temp engine paint, Plastic parts were cleaned and repainted as needed (e.g. Interior window pillar trim), mechanical parts were cleaned and tested (speedometer, heat fan blower, etc.). We do have some spare parts that will go with the car.



Listed very fairly to the CCE community at \$16,750. Yes, we have far more than that in it. I do have most receipts along with Corvair manuals and guides.


