Stock Is...

Larry Claypool

[This article was originally printed in the June 1987 issue of the CCE Airhorn. Larry has updated it to contain information as of 2024.]

If you've been following our look around the Corvair, the next logical step would be the back or rear end view. Since our convention is coming up shortly, I thought I'd run out of sequence a bit and talk about the classification operations check, in hopes those of you bound for the convention won't needlessly lose points.

Classification Operations Check

Operations Check is pretty self-explanatory. Judges check all the parts of your car to see that they are working. You, the owner, do the operating. A piece of cake, you say? So think many entrants who end up with deductions!

Lights: The first thing to be checked. Naturally, you know your two low beam headlamps work and the stop-lights do, too, 'cause you just drove umpteen thousand miles on them. But the less obvious stuff is what gets folks in trouble: license lamps (two on wagons and trucks), high beams, backup lights (especially on stick shifts!), and dome light that works automatically with both doors (except 500's). Cars and trucks may have other lights: glove box, hood, trunk, courtesy, ash tray, side markers, etc. These all need to work properly, too. And a bad ground—causing a light to illuminate dimly (or not at all) will get you a point off, too. So take a few minutes to ensure that all the lamps—and I do mean all—are working as per spec.

Turn Signals are a related subject. The signal must stay on once engaged, (i.e.- if you have to hold the lever down to make the signal work, it's a deduction) and cancel properly when the wheel is turned. If 4-way flashers are present, they too must work.

Horn: The horn should honk by pressing the center cap or horn ring anywhere on its surface. If you've got a car that only honks if you press the right side of the ring, you'll get caught because you will be asked to press center, left and right to be sure all positions work. Poor sound quality will also result in a deduction.

Instrument Panel: A simple case of making sure everything works. Do the temp-press and gen-fan lights come on? Is the gas gauge needle somewhere on the scale, or has a bad ground sent the needle off the end? When is the last time you saw if the lighter really did get hot and pop out? (Note: lighters that pop out and eject into the front seat do not get extra points). Should you be fortunate enough to have a clock, it better be working like, uh, clockwork. Corsas and Spyders additionally feature vacuum, tach, and temp gauges, so a dead needle on any one results in a certain deduction.

If you've installed other gauges, or other anything, for that matter, they must be working. For example, let's say you stuffed the fender full of a high-tech, tri-band, solid state automatic power antenna, but the thing throws craps on the way to the convention and won't go up. A deduction, perhaps? Correct. Simply stated, if it's there, it must work.

Radio: Pretty obvious—the radio ought to play when turned on, and if it's an AM/FM, both bands will be checked for operation. Should you have a rear seat speaker or (gasp!) multiplex/tape player, the fader controls should make smooth transition from one speaker to another. Horrible static when adjusting volume or poor sound quality from a dried out or cracked speaker may also lead to a loss of points.

Foot Controls: The clutch pedal, if so equipped, should have 1/2" to 1" free play at the top end. No squeaking should be heard from any of the linkage when the clutch pedal is worked. Deductions for mis-adjusted brakes are far more common, however. With correct shoe-to-drum clearance, brake pedal travel should be only about 1-2" (parking brake off) with moderate pressure. Numero uno deduction, though, is the parking brake. There are 15 "clicks" of travel available from the parking brake handle. The cable should be adjusted so that by half travel, the brake should be tight enough to hold the car from moving during the "reverse test". What's that you say? The effectiveness of the parking brake will checked by asking the operator to place the running vehicle in reverse, parking brake on, and then give enough throttle to load up the engine or clutch to make sure the car won't move. So it it's pretty hard to 'fake' how much travel the parking brake handle really has.

All the controls are judged on a sliding scale, so the amount deducted varies with the actual deficiency.

Transmission: Shift levers for manual trans should have normal travel and automatics should engage drive and reverse without a pronounced thud or clunk. (the ads said silky smooth, remember?).

Windows/Doors/Locks: More obvious stuff. The windows should roll up and down smoothly with average effort, and vent window handles should not have any slop in their fit to the vent frame post. Lock knobs and release handles, as other controls, should work with average effort and be free of excessive play.

Heater/Air Conditioner: Like everything else, heater and A/C controls should work smoothly and with average effort through their lengths of travel. The heater fan should deliver significant airflow, and no leaves, dirt, or debris should blow out of the ducts when turned on. A/C units should deliver cold air within one minute of being turned on.

Steering/Suspension: There should be no noticeable play in the steering linkage when the steering wheel is turned back and forth slightly, nor should there be excessive bounce or any squeaks during the classic shock-bounce test.

Engine: You will be asked to start the engine. Quietness is all-important here, because anything other than tailpipe emission is frowned upon. Howling fan bearings, screeching alternator bearings, rattling flywheels, screaming pilot bushings

and leaky exhaust gaskets will net you deductions. It needs to idle down nicely. Of course, if the engine stalls or smokes noticeably, you'll get deductions for that too.

Accessories: As I said earlier, if it's there, it had better work. All other items—Chevrolet or otherwise—should operate as intended.

What Is Assumed: Since operation judges do not take your car for a test drive, it is assumed that certain things work as they should. If you have a ring and pinion gear whine, or a noisy wheel bearing, only your mechanic will know for sure. Judges also do not run your wipers or washers (would you want to ask someone with a freshly restored show car to please run their wipers over a hot, dry windshield?), but if the washer bottle is empty, it couldn't *possibly* work, so you'd better top it off with Optikleen or risk a deduction.

That covers the operation checks your car will receive in the classification line. Go back and read that part about the lights—I've seen it happen several times where a deduction is given for an inoperative lamp while the owner proclaims in frustration "I just checked that yesterday and it was OK!"

Tech Tip Winter Storage

Have you prepared you favorite car or cars for hibernation? If not, you may wish to check out the Corsa Tech Guide if you have one. There are some nice articles written by Larry Claypool and others who have dealt with this a time or two. If you just don't have time to go looking for that darn tech guide, here is what I remember from Larry talking to us in the fall of 1997 on storage and a few tips from his articles.

It is not necessary to fill the tank with gas or drain it. Is one better than the other? It is really up to you as the car owner. Do what ever works best for you. A can of Heet or similar product may be helpful in dispersing excess moisture from the fuel system.

Change the oil and filter before storing the car. This will remove any excess moisture and deposits from the crankcase.

Check the tire pressure; fill all of the tires up to 30 psi Put the car on jackstands if you want. Winter storage should not cause any serious deformation to the tires.

Remove the battery cables and install a low voltage trickle charger to the battery. This will keep it fully charged without over charging it over the long winter. If I remember properly, the professor recommends a charger of 20 milli-amps or less. Basically take the cord off an old answering machine or cordless phone that has a plug rated at 20 milli-amps and connect two alligator clips to it. Connect it to your battery and to a power source and you are in business.

Otherwise, I think that is it; a car cover is good to protect the paint from dust and scratches and it also may be helpful to squirt the cables and hinges with some WD-40. If anyone has any other tips, or possibly some extra 20 milliamp plugs. Maybe we can get the new president to bring this up at the November meeting,

Making It Home

Just wanna make it back home.....

Driving an old car can have its 'moments', regardless of the make. The newest car I own wasn't even built during this century, so I guess *all* my cars could be considered old ones. When you drive an old car often, you become adept at "MacGyvering" stuff to get home.

Way back in the early 70's I was driving a 62 Monza convert that began to have fuel starvation troubles whilst on the Dan Ryan expressway towards Chicago. I coasted over to the shoulder and after about 15 minutes of fiddling, determined the fuel pump eccentric or pump pushrod must have become worn out as I could push the pump manually up and down and make it work, but it would not do so when correctly secured by its positioning bolt. As it happened, I was quite near the public transit "L" line that could take me to 22nd street, three blocks away from the famed Warshawsky (A.K.A. JC Whitney "Everything Automotive") location. That I did, and one hour later returned with an inexpensive electric pump, a little wire, some hose and clamps. I bypassed the mechanical pump with the precariously routed rubber hoses, just laid the pump loose on the rear frame rail and hooked the power wire to the positive terminal of the coil; all things I shudder to think of now (but still see people doing it that way on YouTube). But it worked and I was able to drive away under my own power until I could address the problem correctly.

Another time the CCE Slalom Team was up at an autocross in a suburb of Milwaukee, some 140 miles from home. Being young and on a slim budget, nobody had a trailer back then, we'd just tow bar our 'race' cars if it was a long trek. Another club member whose name shall not be mentioned (but his initials are Harry Jensen) was racing his Stinger when it came to screeching halt in the middle of the course. The differential had locked up, probably due to diminished gear oil. We had to use a floor jack under the diff to be able to push it off the course. A car that won't move, and no trailer, tow dolly, or freewheeling hubs to found. What to do? As the diff wasn't a posi, and figuring it was already toast anyway, I surmised if we removed one axle shaft and somehow made something to wedge between the trailing arm and the diff case, we could let the one connected axle turn through the spider gears and tow it home. A suitable 2x4 was located and crudely hacked into something that looked nothing like an upper suspension link, but performed that task admirably, or at least long enough to make it home.

My girlfriend way back then had a well-used Corvan she drove (including all the way to and from the first Seattle convention in '75). I got a call from her one day explaining the accelerator pedal suddenly dropped to the floor while engine remained at idle. Figuring the linkage just fell apart somewhere I was dismayed to find the inner cable itself had broken somewhere in its tortured and mostly inaccessible route to the back of the van—a job that would require more resources than the parallel parking spot it had stopped at. We found (or bought, I can't remember) a piece of clothesline, and with the engine cover removed, tied one end to the carburetor cross shaft, and the other to the front seat adjuster lever, with just

enough extra to run over my left shoulder. Throttle action was now possible by leaning forward, which pulled open the cross shaft and thus the carbs. Drove it back the shop that way.

Much more recently at the '17 convention in Independence, I came across good my friend, the late Burt Neuner, sitting on the shoulder of the road during the rally with smoke billowing out of the right rear wheel. He explained that brakes were getting hot and was dragging badly. Experience told me it was a collapsed brake hose, having suffered a similar fate myself in 2009 at the Jacksonville convention. We *could* have called a tow truck, but I put forth the proposition I could 'fix' this enough to get back to the hotel. With that, the tire was removed (make note—don't hold onto those hot lug nuts!) and a quick turn of the bleeder screw released the trapped fluid pressure and brake was released. To make sure it stayed that way, I beat the trailing arm steel brake flat with a suitable hammer, thus preventing any further brake application on that wheel. Burt then drove it back to the host hotel without further ado.

Such repairs are not confined to Corvairs. Many of you have seen my 'driver' Cadillac Deville, now celebrating it's 26th birthday. Last year while driving to Indiana to Shelly's mom's, the power steering pump began whining, and eventually quit being power. Once at our destination, I didn't have to investigate very far to find the power steering oil cooler, located in front of the air conditioning condenser, had gotten rusty enough to spring a leak (big clue--oil was dripping off the outside of the grill). I reasoned that none of my other big cars had a power steering cooler, so the old Cad could probably get along without one as well. A quick stop at the Logansport Rural King store, conveniently open at 7 AM, armed me with a pair of cheap pliers, a screwdriver, two clamps, and two quarts of steering juice. They didn't have much in the way of actual auto parts besides batteries and oil, but they did have a marvelous plumbing department where I picked up two six-inch pieces of galvanized 1/8" steel pipe and a coupler to join them. About 20 minutes of fiddling to remove the hoses from the leaky cooler later, the old hoses slid onto my foot long 'bypass' pipe rather nicely. Clamps tightened and steering pump refilled, it worked perfectly and will remain so until that car's dying day.

Some things are just too severe to MacGyver up—like when the clutch disc flings off all its lining into the extremities of the bellhousing, or a front wheel/tire/brake drum and remnants of the glowing red hot wheel bearing go careening off your car towards the shoulder and beyond. But Rick Herda did relate to me he saw some unmemorable rear wheel drive car plodding down Western Avenue in Chicago on a nice summer day sans right front wheel. In its place was the bottom half of some store's now long missing shopping cart, placed strategically under the lower control arm. Confident in this solution, the driver wheeled along as if nothing was out of the ordinary. As long as he avoided the big potholes and manhole covers, I am sure he made it home.


With a little thought and the barest of resources, you probably can too.
