

# Why I like Las Vegas



I have been to Las Vegas, Nevada more than once and the first time could be described as a visit by a naive and completely unsophisticated young man to "sin city" and included an eye-popping visit to "Théâtre du Lido à Paris" with scantily-clad girls and a high-flying circus act. The second visit

was quite different. I'll tell the story if you give me some leeway on my memories from fifty-six years ago.

I ordered my first Corvair, new, in 1966. It was a Lemonwood-Yellow turbo Corsa coupe and when it was delivered I got a ride from Dayton to Detroit to pick it up at Lyman-Slack Chevrolet. The Corvair was to take me to a tour of duty in Alaska - and the air-cooled Corvair should be perfect for the frozen North -- you know, no antifreeze. A year later the Air Force sent me to Holloman AFB in New Mexico. Yes, from the frozen tundra to the desert. I joined a local sports car club in Alamogordo and one of the members happened to be Richard Finch, a long-time Corvair enthusiast.



While the turbo Corvair had made the trip from Dayton to Fairbanks without incident, had served without fail through the winter of 1966-1967 in Alaska, and then made a 5,000-mile trek down the Alaska Highway

through Canada, I found myself becoming unhappy with the turbo engine. It was great on the highway but was a no-torque dog in town driving. I complained to Richard and his answer was simple: replace the 180-HP turbo engine with a 140-HP four-carb engine. With a few minor mods the 140 would deliver plenty of low-speed torque, would go just as well on the highway and would get better gas

mileage. Richard did not like turbos and he had ideas for making a 140 Corsa engine run better.

The idea was simple but it turned out to involve quite a lot of money and even more mechanical labor. We bought a new engine from Sacramento Chevrolet in Alamogordo, New Mexico and took it apart to begin a "blueprint" treatment such as I had never imagined. It was a great engine-building experience with a master engineer.

We finished up the engine just a few weeks before I left the Air Force to go to graduate school. I intended to drive the super Corvair to California, visiting people and places along the way, then head across the country to Dayton where I'd embark in my new academic career.

The new engine performed superbly. All moving parts having been carefully balanced, it was indeed smooth, powerful and relatively thrifty with the 41-cent fuel of the day. Tucson, San Diego, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Reno were some of the places I visited. On the empty highways of Nevada I could get it up to the red line on the tach for minutes at a time without a complaint.


I could not tell the car's speed at the red line, though, because at about 52,000-miles the speedometer had failed. Well, I could try to get that fixed sooner or later. Meanwhile, I could guess at speed from the tach reading.

Suddenly with no warning, on a lonely stretch of highway somewhere between Reno and Las Vegas, there arose an awful howl from the back of the car! I stopped and looked over the engine and could see nothing amiss! It was idling fine and there was nothing loose or broken that I could see. Back in the driver's seat and getting back on the highway and building up some speed the howl came back. I stopped again -- same result as before, nothing wrong that I could detect.

Fortunately I was not far from Las Vegas and, driving slowly to keep the howl at a low intensity, I was able to creep into the city and find a Chevrolet dealer.

The service manager listened to my story and to the howl and sent me to the waiting room while he assigned a mechanic to find the problem. In a few minutes he came back. It's fixed, he said, we just had to tighten up the nut holding the alternator pulley. It was loose and that made it slip and howl.

What do I owe you? I asked. Nothing, he said, not worth the paperwork. Just remember that that nut has a left-handed thread and when you tighten it up you need to turn it the wrong way. Maybe that's why it was left a little too loose.



I told him the speedometer had quit working and could he fix it. He said, Well, we could, but there's a great instrument shop nearby and they'll be able to fix that for you. He gave me directions to the shop and sure enough, in a couple of hours the speedometer was as good as new. And the charge was minimal.

And that adventure is why, ever since, I have had a soft spot in my heart for a very different, and very pleasant, side of sin city!
