Fixing Broken Plastic Pieces On Your Car By Ed Halpin

As I've been bringing the '67 Sedan back to life, I've come across several areas where little plastic pieces have either broken off, or, there are big chunks of plastic just missing from the piece. On the 4-door models, one area that seems to take a beating is the door post pillar plastic that sits in on the interior, between the two doors. This part is secured to the interior with a single screw, attached at the top of the center post, and from what I'm told, the screw hole breaks very easily (one of mine was broke). I was also told that this is a really tough part to try to find, intact. Wanting to avoid an extensive parts search, I looked for ways to fix the plastic piece myself. Good old YouTube provided the guidance with a short how-to video on "welding plastic". As I watched the video clip, I was reminded of melting plastic with a magnifying glass when I was a kid. Get it hot enough to smoke, and then, poof, it would catch on fire. Pretty cool when you're a kid, but my wife wouldn't take too kindly to me burning down the house by melting plastic in the garage, so I focused my attention back to the video. What I learned was that different plastics, or polymers, have different melting points. Many plastics are shaped by heating them until they are soft, and then molding, pressing, stamping, or forming in some other way. This was the case when the door pillar plastic was molded by Chevy. No chance of this hard plastic flaming up on me, so I headed off to Harbor Freight to get a plastic welding kit and have some fun.

The kit itself is pretty basic, consisting of a heating tool (similar to a soldering iron), some strips of filler plastic, and some strengthening material (wire mesh), and the instructions were easy to understand. It only ran me about \$15. To gain some experience, I practiced on some old, unwanted material, melting, and joining, re-melting, burning holes through stuff, but all the time learning and getting better at making the process work. Understanding how plastic actually reacts to different levels of heat was pretty interesting. So, now on to fixing the Corvair piece.





I found an old fire extinguisher mounting bracket which resembled the type of hard plastic the Corvair piece was made out of, and from that, I cut out a piece, roughly the same size to fill the existing hole. Using a similar technique from welding metal and other materials, I "tack" welded the corners. Tack welding involves engineering short intermittent welds designed to hold the two pieces in place before full welding is begun. In doing so, I was careful on how much heat was being transferred to the whole project so it didn't warp.



I then just moved the "iron" around the plastic, melting and molding the two pieces together.



In the end, I now have a completely solid part, stronger and a little thicker, able to better handle the pressure of that single center post attaching screw. I learned something new, and, I had fun doing it, with no fires in the garage.



Autocross Deliberation

RMC would like to set up another autocross. We need to have roughly 20 participants to make it interesting, but that lofty number has eluded us. If you've not participated in this simple form of automotive sport, perhaps this simple primer will answer some of the questions that are often asked by first-timers. (continued page 6)

Some things to know:

- 1. This is not a high speed event; it is a precision driving event.
- 2. The total time on the course is usually less than a minute your Corvair will not overheat, and the speeds are slow enough the brakes are rarely challenged.
- 3. The biggest physical risk (in a Corvair) is a sprained wrist or finger from trying to wind and unwind the steering quickly. Seriously.

Car preparation: Note that these are all checked during Tech Inspection:

- 1. Oil level should be at the factory mark to prevent possible pickup starvation in abrupt cornering.
- 2. Tire pressures should be above factory recommendations to firm up steering response and improve traction they can always be lowered as necessary to tune the performance.
- 3. All the loose junk that might fly around in the trunk or passenger compartment, such as Best of Show trophies and your schnauzer, should be removed prior to the event.
- 4. The brakes should have a firm pedal.
- 5. The battery must be firmly secured in place.

Driving the course:

1. The course is marked in the parking lot using cones, and possibly white indicators written on the pavement.

- 2. The direction of the course should be clearly defined the preferred preparation is a pre-event walk-through.
- 3. Repeated confusion means the course was not marked well, and that situation is usually corrected by the course designer.
- 4. Participants are timed from a starting line, through a finish line.
- 5. If cones are —relocated during the run, time is added for each relocation (cone contact).
- 6. Most autocross courses have a series of slalom cones for repeat left-right oscillation.
- 7. The greatest amount of damage typically incurred at an autocross event, if any, is orange plastic coloration transferred to your car's paint!

RMC members (and our friends at PPCC) are strongly encouraged to attend an autocross event to explore the handling and control limits of their Corvairs. Unless your religion, NSA security clearance, spouse, parent, or other authority absolutely forbids you to participate in autocross/solo events, it's about as much fun as you can have fully clothed. It also teaches you more about the limits of your car than any other legal activity.

Don't have a Corvair, or your Corvair isn't currently running? RMC-sanctioned event insurance covers entrants driving other vehicles, even brand X with waterpumper power. Watch for announcements of our late summer/early fall event – you won't want to miss this!
