SALT FEVER - A Visit to Bonneville Salt Flats

Salt Fever? Got Salt? Save the Salt! SHOOT THE SALT!! All new phrases to me this past month, especially when it related to cars.

I had just finished a twelve hour drive from Medford, OR to Wendover, NV, when I pulled into the Nugget Hotel Casino to find the parking lot full of a variety of cars covered in salt! It didn't take long to realize, it the Bonneville Speed Week.

I had driven across the Salt Lake Desert many times with family, but had never been there for Speed Week. There was such an assortment of cars from streamliners to rat-rods and a very friendly group of folks around the cars to chat with. In talking with some of them, I found out that I could drive out on the Salt Flats to watch the races the next day, even if I was driving my Honda.

Early the next day when I should have been driving across the desert, I drove off the first exit, heading out to the Bonneville Salt Flats. Passing the campsites, I found the end of the asphalt and the beginning of the salt! As I passed this point, all I was told



was to stay to the left of the cones. When I came across a speed limit sign, I chuckled at the fact that the land speed races were running and here was a posted speed limit....55!

Parking at the beginning of the race, I talked with racers waiting their turn to run, as well as some long timers who had been there since the late 50's and 60's. They were especially informative when they found out it was my first time 'on the flats.' I told them how I had a Corvair and had friends who raced their cars. I was told anyone can register to drive on the speed races and Corvairs had been known to be there as well, setting speed records in their class. I learned about the different classifications, and how only one car or motorcycle raced at a time......they raced against the time clock.

I was watching the long races, with a 5 mile track and a 2 mile stretch to stop after the final time was taken. Due to the high gear ratios of some cars, there was a wooden bumper attached so they could be pushed the first quarter mile to get up to a speed where the car could be popped into gear. I watched the cars at the starting line

for a while and then drove on down to mid-point on the track where the pits were. Anyone was allowed to wander through the pits, talk to the racers, as well as watch the cars at speed. They were pretty much a blurr as they flew by!

I thought it was interesting that if a car or motorcycle didn't make speed in their class, the team could go into the pits, make some tweaks or modifications to change the class of the vehicle, reregister, and race it again. If it made time, the racer/cycle was moved to an impound lot and kept there for 24 hours. Then it had to race again and meet or beat its first time in order to qualify for the record books.

The day I was there, over 300 racers were on the flats waiting to race on one of three tracks. I

was told that two days earlier there had been over 600!

As I was driving off the salt to 'continue my trip' home, I stopped to see a beautiful streamliner, which had just set a new time in its class. It was called 'Got Salt'. It would be heading to its home in Southern CA where it would be readied for its next race.

So I now had 'Salt Fever' and it's not a bad thing to get. I had 'Got Salt' even if it was with the Honda. But best of all, I was able to 'Shoot the Salt" at 55 mph! WHEEEEEEEEE!


As we headed up the boardwalk porch to the res-

As far as we know, the ride back home was uneventful for everyone, but if not, I'm sure we'll hear about it during the October meeting on the 16th.







It's Election Season!! - Nominations for PPCC Officers Being Accepted By The Board Through November 20th

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Officers: The elected Officers of this PPCC shall be: President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

SECTION 2. Elections: A call for volunteers to serve as Officers and Board members will be announced at the November meeting. Officers will be elected at the December meeting by majority vote of the members present, and will take office on January 1. In the case of a tie, a run-off vote shall be held.

Only members shall be entitled to volunteer for a position or submit a nomination. If no nominations are received for an Officer or Board position, the Board of Directors may select a candidate to fill the position.

No person shall be a candidate for office or Board position unless they have been a PPCC member for at least one year.

Each Officer will serve for one year, or until his/her successor is elected, except for the office of Vice President which Officer will act as President in the event of the incapacitation or resignation of the President.

ARTICLE VII - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. Board Composition: Board of Directors shall consist of the elected Officers, the immediate past President (who will serve a one year term), and one member-at-large from the general membership. The member-at-large shall be elected in accordance with Article IV, Section 2.
